Fifty years is a long time




JACOB BUSCH

Jacob Busch was the man with the dream. Busch was a businessman and resident of St. Petersburg, Fla., and a member of the Tampa Bay Unit of the Wally Byam Caravan Club. He recognized the fact that fellow members of the club who wanted to winter in Florida had few, if any, nice parks in which to stay. In truth, some of the parks were downright terrible.

Beginning in 1969, Busch, along with Ed Noes, who shared his interest, began searching for property in central Florida. The problem was to find a property that was both suited to their purpose and would fit their pocketbook.

The bulldozer, shown above, totally reconfigured the topography of the land.

Fact: The swampland had to be raised 4 feet to build the golf course.

Question: Where does one get enough soil to raise the land 4 feet?

Answer: Paul Ruth actually calculated how much dirt would be needed to make this happen. His answer was to create Mirror Lake. The size of Mirror Lake was determined by how much soil was needed to create the golf course. Wasn't he the clever one?

Paul Ruth, after whom the Paul Ruth building was named, was "the man who made it happen."

Paul and his wife Betty arrived from Ohio in 1973. Ruth was a farmer and he and his son had established an Airstream polishing and refinishing business. The Ruths had heard about TR and arrived expecting to find a finished park. Were they in for a surprise! What they found was a muddy mess and a park in financial crisis.

Busch and Ruth bonded almost from the day they met. The combined efforts of these two men brought the dream to fruition.



The Alliance Stamp Ministry was started in 1972 at Shell Point Village in Fort Myers, Fla. Since that time volunteers have collected and sorted USED postage stamps. These are valuable to stamp distributors who then sell them to collectors.

In 2018 the ministry reached one million dollars and as of October this year the total is an additional \$23,000. This is a phenomenal way to help spread the gospel and it really does not cost us anything.

The income generated from this ministry goes to support the preparation, publishing and distribution of a Spanish language curriculum for Sunday Schools. More than 50 lesson series have been published and are being used in different denominations and missions in 19 different countries in South and Central America, Spain and even in the U.S.

They can use nearly any stamp. For many years I have saved and collected used postage stamps and sent them to the stamp ministry.

Please begin now to save your stamps. Don't cut closer than ½ inch around the stamp. Do not soak them off the envelopes. Send to Jean Helker's mailbox (2640). I will mail them to The Stamp Ministry. Thank you so much!



The Servant's Plow



When God is silent

by Rev. Anthony B. Shipe 1st Peter 5: 6-7

Therefore humble yourselves under the mighty hand of god, that he may exalt you at the proper time, casting all your anxiety on him, because he cares for you.

Silence. Sometimes what causes us the most pain and confusion isn't what God says to us but the fact that in the midst of difficulty He seems to say nothing at all.

Has God been silent in your life as you have waited for an answer?

That's how it was for Job. He wanted to hear from God. He wanted to understand why he was suffering. He wanted God to clear his good name. "Let the Almighty answer me," Job pleaded.

Finally, after all the questioning and struggle, in a voice from out of a storm, God spoke.

God asked where Job was when God began the work of creation. What had Job done to call the universe into being, to create his own life, or to make possible the existence of his possessions or his children or his health?

You might expect God to have answered all those chapters of questions from Job and his friends who tried to explain how God works. You might expect that God would have set the record straight.

But that isn't what God did.

He answered Job's questions with a set of His own questions four chapters of them—to remind

Job that he was questioning Almighty God.

God didn't explain. He didn't reveal His master plan. Instead He revealed Himself and in the midst of His awesome presence Job's questions weren't answered—they simply disappeared.

The Lord said to Job, "Do you still want to argue with the Almighty? You want to be MY critic but do you have the answers?"

Then Job replied to the Lord, "I am nothing-how could I ever find the answers? I will put my hand over my mouth in silence, I have said too much already. I have nothing more to say."

In His response God did not explain the meaning of suffering or how to avoid it. Suffering is a mystery, and Job humbly came to respect the mystery. He came to grasp the great mystery because God revealed who He was. Job would learn to accept what God gave and what He took awayeven when he didn't understand it. It was a humbling experience.

Job had no idea that he was a player in an immense confrontation. If you read the Book of Job you would be privy to the clash between God and Satan. Job had no idea the reasons for the context of his suffering. He had no idea that his faithfulness in extreme difficulty mattered so much. But it did. Job teaches us that our response in testing and trials matters too. Like Job we cannot see God's hidden purposes. Yet we can determine to be faithful and keep walking toward the Lord. Pray with me.

We are strangers to many things, Heavenly Father, but most of all we are strangers to silence itself. We find ourselves so busily engaged in life, rushing through our days, our activity is constant. Rarely do we ever slow down... and sit in silence...and let Your awesome presence fill us. Help us to do that right now. May we rest in the quiet of this moment. May we obey your command...to be still...and be silent...and remind ourselves...that You are Almighty

We cast our cares upon You. We release our struggles and place them upon Your shoulders. We give our worried hearts to You. We rest in the knowledge that Your Spirit empowers us to live a life beyond our own ability. You free us to rest in the joy of who you are. We thank You for these things in the name of Jesus. AMEN

The Siren

Well, we are not as young as we used to be, but we are certainly not as old as we intend to become! We try to eat healthy and exercise to be fit but do we take safety precautions as seriously as we

should? COVID-19 continues to present challenges this season. Most of us are itching to get back to a social schedule that involves close contact with family, friends and neighbors. Please do not let your guard down. We have already had three known positive COVID cases in the park, and we are likely to have more, especially with travel to and from TR and mingling associated with the holidays. Unless something huge happens, the TR Board has determined that buildings will be open and Activity Chairpersons will make decisions about when, where and how activities will be offered.

All of us are responsible for deciding whether we choose to get vaccine or a booster, wear a mask, socially distance, or even attend activities, so choose your level of protection and research the specifics of the activities you care

Safety – First, Last, and Always!

to attend. Please stay home if you are feeling ill, achy, or feverish and go for a COVID test or get a kit and test at home.

If you test positive, please quarantine, notify me, strongly consider notifying all of TR (or at least those you might have infected), and quarantine for 10 days after your first symptom or the day you tested positive. Symptoms of COVID include: cough, sore throat, congestion, headache, body aches, fever above 100.4 degrees, loss of taste and/or smell, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea.

CDC guidance says: If you are FULLY VACCINATED (including booster after 6 months) AND you have been in close contact (less than 6 ft for more than a total of 15 minutes) to someone who tests positive, AND you have no symptoms, (1) you don't have to quarantine, but you should wear a mask indoors for 14 days or until you have a negative COVID test, and (2) you should COVID test, but no sooner than 5-7 days after your exposure. If you test positive or develop symptoms at any point, you should isolate from others, including family, for 10 days.

Per the CDC, if you are NOT FULLY VACCINATED (or did not get your booster after 6 months) AND have been in close contact (less than 6 ft for more than a total of 15 minutes) to someone who tests positive, you should (1) quarantine immediately for 14 days, (2) get tested 5-7 days after your exposure, and (3) isolate if you test positive or whenever you experience COVID symptoms for another 10 days.

TR First Responders also have a challenge this year. We have always responded to your emergencies and provided care until the ambulance arrives. We will continue to do that, with some modifications. First, we will limit the number of responders who enter a residence. Second, we will ask everyone in the residence to wear a mask and maintain a 6 ft distance. If the 911 call involves COVID-19 or flu-like symptoms, we will likely remain outside of the residence unless we need to provide immediate care for the patient. Medical personnel on the ambulance have full protective equipment to treat and transport.

Some safety pointers for TR: DON'T SPEED OBSERVE STOP SIGNS! As a bicycle rider or driver of a car or golf cart, it is important to observe the park speed limit of 10 mph, be super attentive and expect the unexpected. Please come to a full stop at intersections, look carefully both ways before you proceed and be particularly careful when you back up. As active as our residents may be, some have vision or hearing loss; some may not move very quickly when crossing the street; some may wear clothing hard to see at night; some may step out in front of a moving vehicle without warning. In addition, some medications make driving risky and some of us just don't navigate as well after dark. Make good choices - be safe!

BE VISIBLE! As a bicyclist or golf cart operator, be sure your lights are shining brightly when you venture out in the evening. Wear a helmet when you bicycle. If you are bicycling or walking, choose bright, preferably reflective clothing so drivers can spot you easily. If the area you are walking in has a sidewalk, please use it rather than the street because drivers will not expect to see pedestrians in the street after dark. Make good choices – be safe!

USE CAUTION WHEN CLIMBING! When you need to go high, inside or outside, use a ladder rather than something intended for another purpose and make sure it is tall enough and safely set up. Move the ladder to reach that place you need to lean, stretch or get to rather than risk toppling over. If you have dizziness or get lightheaded, ask someone else to hang those Christmas lights or drapes, or change that battery in your smoke/carbon monoxide detectors.

> Make good choices. Be safe. Reminders:

If you haven't already changed the batteries in your smoke or carbon monoxide detectors, do it now! If you have the battery and need help with the change out, call Chief Larry Polzin at 810-247-2361 or Lt. Jean Cobb at 256-508-8661. Because of COVID-19, the TR Fire/Rescue Station will not be offering blood pressure or blood sugar screening until further notice.



Wish list for Santa

In early March 2020 a marvelous 2019-20 season of TR group travel events was nearly completed and the next travel season planned. Your volunteer TR Tour Directors were feeling pleased with their first year of leading trips together and certainly delighted in the friendships made. Throughout the season, more than 200 people had traveled with us to one or more destination: 3 days in St. Augustine, 11 days on a Panama Canal cruise, and day trips that included a St. John River cruise and a performance of *The Singing Christmas Trees.* Only the day trip to the winter home of the Lipizzaner stallions remained and already we were booking day trips for the following season.

Then the world changed! On March 11 the World Health Organization declared a global pandemic. With the extra measure of hand sanitizing and disinfecting frequently touched surfaces on the bus, we cautiously led our group of 30-some TR travelers to the Sarasota area for an Amish buffet lunch and the outdoor performance of the famous Lipizzaner's. We did not yet know how a global pandemic would affect all our lives.

We continued communication with B & D Travel Agency, and collected deposits for the next season of travel before we found the Out of Business sign on their Zephyrhills office door. The pandemic had all but halted group travel. Most travel agencies had gone from selling travel experiences to refunding payments or rebooking trips, but the B & D Travel Agency did not communicate with us, re-book any events or refund any deposits. Months later, a number of TR travelers who had receipts and made application, were granted refunds from the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.

On March of 2021, I made a Dan and Sharon Z. written request of the TR Board of Directors for TR Travel to become a member of the Travelers Rest Activity Group so that our funds for future trips could be held within TRAG much like other TR activity

groups. We had hoped that TR Tour Directors could plan trips and hire a bus company for transportation, rather than paying a travel agency. It was not until October that we received a letter from the Board President, declining our request, citing liability issues.

So is TR Travel finished? Traveling with our TR friends offers so many benefits, most especially the anticipation of the "next trip." Travel has been so much a part of the legacy of TR life. Your TR Travel Directors will make a request to a higher authority - SANTA! We definitely know what we want! Santa is quite the traveler, so perhaps he'll bring us all that we need.

Dear Santa, please grant our wishes! We promise to share this with really awesome friends.

- One fully licensed, bonded and insured full-service travel agency to handle day trips, multiday trips and cruises.
- Must be an established company. Many years would be great!
- Must be willing to customize trips for TR. Pickup at TR, too.
- Must have their own nice clean buses with PA system, restroom, air conditioning and courteous drivers. A DVD player would be a bonus!

Birding Activity

What's about? Interesting birds at TR

Welcome to any birders visiting TR for the first time and to the many regular residents who have enjoyed bird watching around our various habitats. In particular welcome to any who call themselves beginners or who may not be familiar with species to be seen here that are not normally around in their home state. All are welcome. Contact Tom Butler or me with any questions.

Many folks just observe birds all the time when going about their normal activities. Some get more involved with identifying the rarer and confusing species and still others are just getting started.

Over the next few weeks together we will be seeing "what's about?" I record a "best bird" which can be seen by me or you, if you tell me about it.

Tom Butler will be leading the Tuesday morning bird walk which starts at 8 a.m. from the Post Office Veranda. If you want to be tempted about some of our species, please see Tom's great TR photo display currently in the Post Office corridor. (It may be moved to Busch Hall when COVID restrictions are relaxed.)

With Florida being a major sub-tropical conservation area it is also a major birding habitat that is home to around 190 breeding species. These increase to some 300 in total when the migratory species are included. Here at TR we have recorded well over 100 species seen during our winter season from Jan. 1 to March 31. Many of those sightings are passage birds. We hope you will add to your bird lists, or start new ones for TR and also check out our own bird trail developed by Tom Butler with some 18 feeder stations.

Migration started for many bird species way back in August. It's a long way from Canada to TR if you are only a sparrow-sized but the need for food supply certainly is the principal migration driving force. The shortening length of daylight hours is thought to be the trigger that starts the trek for most birds. Everyone knows that TR snowbirds are so named because they also migrate south each year in search of food in the warmth just like the feathered variety. However, did you know that John James Audubon, the Father of American Birding, was the originator of the



Dark-eyed Junco

In the early 19th century Audubon named a sparrow species as the moon-snowbird because it moved south from Canada in the millions at the first threat of snow. Today that species, now renamed Dark-eyed Junco, still breeds across the complete width of Canada and then they all winter in the southern states...just like us. It a "lifer" at TR? is quite rare for them to move any

further south than Georgia in the east so we had a typical TR "best bird" bird fest when we had one Junco here for about three weeks in 2017. Interestingly the female Juncos winter much further south than the males and it is said by some researchers that this is so that the males get back to Canada first in order to start preparing the nest site, etc...hmmm.

In future weeks more information on the TR Bird Trail and notes on the characteristics and behavior of some of the various bird groups can be found in this weekly col-
