More than 70 residents attend Forum

The second Resident Forum of the season was opened promptly at 3 p. m. by Board President Kathy Shawver. Other Board members present were: Randy Doell, Leo Lejeune, Russell Marlowe, Debbie May, Sheila Schencke, Linda Smith and Jim Weigand.

Shawver began by advising new residents that paint and supplies were available at no cost for repainting sheds. Simply submit a request to the Office. Lawnmowers were also available to borrow at Maintenance. They should be signed out on the appropriate form above the door.

An introduction was given to our new website which may be accessed at https:/travelersrestresort.com.

Attendees were shown how to log in to the Resident portion of the site. Those logging in will be asked to provide their user name, first and last names, email address and password. Office will confirm this information and then grant

Shawver reminded people that the park was born based on volunteerism. It is necessary to maintain this practice as it is what helps to keep park costs reason-

Spectrum is in the process of installing cables and hardware to the entire park. Once construction is complete installation will begin. The service will be turned on to the entire park simultaneously. After this occurs it will be necessary for

shareholders to call Spectrum to establish their individual accounts. This account information will be needed if users decide they need additional boxes, etc.

Spectrum will provide an initial box to each unit. The box may either be received in the mail or picked up. The homeowners may install the equipment themselves if they know how to do so. Otherwise Spectrum will send someone to do the installation. All this is at no cost.

Jim Weigand noted that the majority of stockholders had renewed their leases. Oak View is completely booked for the season and our cash flow is better than it has been for the past four to five years. Weigand also thanked all those who had sent cards and

prayers during his recent bout with COVID.

Regarding COVID, buildings are currently open. Masks and social distancing are encouraged. However, masks are required in the Main Office and both the Post Office lobby and window. All regulations regarding the virus is subject to change based on changing conditions, so everyone should watch for changes to listed activities. The park's current stance is that everyone is responsible for their own safety. If you feel ill, please stay home and be tested to determine if you have a cold, the flu or the virus. If positive, please immediately inform your social circle, Jean Cobb and the Main Office. Also Shawver reminded residents of the laws regarding HIPAA privacy. If an activity chairperson is immune compromised they may ask anyone attending their activity to wear a mask. Participants will be expected to comply with this request.

TR's 50th Anniversary will be celebrated with a full day of activities on Saturday, Feb. 5. Events will include but are not limited to food, dancing, music and opening our time capsule. More information to follow.

The question and answer period only generated a few questions:

1 – What is the schedule for the food trucks and where can it be found? This information is usually posted on the board in the Post Office lobby.

2 – A resident noted the difference between recycling and trash. Cardboard boxes should be flattened and only cardboard and paper is to be placed in that receptacle. He noted that recycled paper produces revenue, but if trash is included in that bin, it becomes an expense.

3 – How much was spent on the new Pickleball Courts and who was responsible for any adjustments that were required after the installation. Shawver replied that the cost is proprietary to the Board. Also the cost was less than half of the estimate submitted by the Pickleboard activity group. The courts have been built to specifications with no additional cost to the Board for any adjustments required.

With no further questions Doug Pedersen asked if he could make a statement. He reminded those attending that candidates were needed for the Board. He urged interested residents to submit their names. As a past Board President he assured everyone that there was life after serving on the Board.

Shawver announced that the next Veranda Chat will be on Monday, Dec. 20 at 3 p.m.

The next Resident Forum will not take place on the first Monday of January. Due to the holiday, it is scheduled for Monday, Jan. 10 at 3 p.m.

Fifty years is a long time Second in a series of articles to showcase TR

You are probably aware that Jacob Busch was the man who came up with the idea of an Airstream park in central Florida. The interesting story is how he converted his dream into reality.

At an Airstream rally in 1972 Busch described his idea to fellow Airstreamers. In order to put his plan into action he needed capital to finance the project. He requested that interested parties contribute \$500. They were to put down \$100 initially and pay the balance of \$400 when TR stock was issued.

Amazingly at this meeting 156 shares were spoken for and \$80,000 was pledged even though the corporation had yet to be formed and the land we know today as TR had neither been found nor purchased. Remember, the park was only a dream. If the situation were to occur today, would you put up money to support another person's dream? To put this in better perspective, \$500 in 1972 was equivalent to \$3,564.29 in today's market. Wow!

Apparently no one was suspicious that this was a scam. How times have changed.

Eventually the land was purchased and the corporation was formulated as a traditional forprofit business corporation, registered in the State of Florida and operating under Florida Law.

The Corporation would be run

by a Board of Directors with the Board electing its officers including a President who would serve as a the Chief Executive Officer. Stockholders would have their say in two ways: by electing the members of the Board and by attendance at a State of Florida mandated Annual Meeting of Stockholders where they could express their concerns.

In April 1972 the site we know as TR was located on a family farm of 160 acres in the "Florida Alps." The purchase price was \$1,000 per acre with the total being \$160,000.

Some of the early stockholders felt the land was "too far out in the boonies." Luckily the majority loved the rolling hills, the natural beauty, the clean air and tranquility. Read more about TR next week.

According to the Corporation for National and Community Service "the first and biggest benefit people get from volunteering is the satisfaction of incorporating service into their lives and making a difference in their community and country." The article further states that pride, satisfaction and accomplishment are worthwhile reasons to serve. When we share our time and talents, we feel a sense of satisfaction.

Stephen G. Post, PhD, professor of preventive medicine and author, states that volunteerism has lasting physical and psychological benefits. Those who volunteer regularly have healthier hearts,

less chronic pain and bolstered immune systems. Older volunteers are most likely to receive greater benefits from volunteering due to the greater sense of purpose.

A volunteer establishes a stronger relationship with others, increases functional physical abilities and can lower rates of depression. By volunteering we shift our attention to the needs of others rather than ourselves while our cortisol (stress hormone) levels decrease. A 2013 study of over 1,500 adults found that those who volunteered at least 200 hours per year (4 hours a week) were 40 percent less likely to develop high blood pressure as compared to non-volunteers.

Here at Travelers Rest, volunteers are critical. I look around and I truly marvel at the volunteering spirit that helps to make TR what it is. By volunteering here at TR you will not only benefit your overall health status, but you will make new friends and continue the traditions/activities that we all


agree that the Civil Rights Act was passed in large part due to the influence of that historic gathering.

How is your driving?

When I think about driving my mind divides the activity into two parts, driving within the park and out on public roads.

Individuals who do this should realize that cars backing out of spaces in this area are traditionally looking for on-coming traffic coming from one direction. If you are "going against the flow" you put yourself at risk.

When driving outside TR I never ceased to be amazed at the crazy things drivers do. Just this week I was driving down Lake Iola Road and had my signal on to make a left turn onto Johnston Road. Would you believe a car passed me as I was about to make the turn? If the timing had been just a little different, I would have broadsided the car.

As experienced drivers it is important for us to be cognizant of the risks some younger drivers take on a regular basis. Hopefully we do not take the same risks.

Perhaps it would be a good idea to retake a Safe Driving Course. Not only does this course refresh your understanding of driving laws but it has the additional benefit of providing a discount on your car

The Firemen and First Responders of Station 33 again welcome everyone back to TR for the winter season. I'm sure we all have great expectations that we will renew old friendships, make new friends, participate in a ton of activities and enjoy the entertainment, as well as bask in the warm temperatures and glorious Florida sunshine, even as we take personal precautions to avoid COVID-19!

What can you expect of your TR Firemen and First Responders? We pledge to the residents of TR that we are ready when emergencies happen. We train every Tuesday morning, offer emergency support to large park functions and provide first response to all 911 calls while units from Pasco County Fire/Rescue are enroute. We are all certified in cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and use of an automated external defibrillator (AED). We also have members who can assist with changing batteries in smoke or carbon monoxide detectors. Also, we keep a small inventory of donated medical equipment (walkers, wheelchairs, crutches, canes) that we can loan to park residents when they need it. We will also provide blood pressure and blood sugar screening this season unless COVID makes it too difficult to accomplish.

What do TR Firemen and First Responders expect of TR residents? The Firemen and First Responders have great expectations that we will all avoid injury

and illness while we have fun. But when a fire, injury, or severe illness occurs, dial 911 immediately to summon help. Give your 4-digit lot number to the 911 dispatcher. At your site be sure your lot number is clearly evident so responders can reach you quickly. Valuable time is also saved when you complete the health information page in the TR Vial of Life for each person in your residence and store it in your refrigerator door. Also, be extra cautious to avoid a major source of injury for our residents - slips, trips and falls in and around your residence. Please practice safe driving when operating your bicycle, golf cart or auto, including observance of the TR 10 mph speed limit.

Tell me about the TR siren, please...

Tuesdays at 9 a.m. we have a weekly SIREN TEST lasting 5-15 seconds. This is a locally triggered test to be sure the siren is functioning as expected.

A 911 Siren is a 1-minute STEADY BLAST which is triggered by Pasco County Dispatch any time of the day or night when Emergency or Fire Services are on the way to Travelers Rest in response to a call to 911 services.

The **red siren button** on the front of the TR Fire Station triggers

a one minute, WARBLING BLAST that alerts First Responders in the park, but does NOT alert Pasco County 911 Dispatch services. We recommend that you do not use this button to summon emergency help; phoning 911 by cellphone or landline is a much

[Rarely used] Hurricane or Tornado warning is 3 LONG blasts, a 15-second pause and repeats. This warning is locally triggered after a direction from the Pasco County Emergency Operations Center is received. It will be rare for a tornado warning to sound because of the abrupt onset and relatively short life of a tornado. Please, when weather is bad, turn on your TV or radio and listen for tornado alerts issued by the weather service.

What should TR residents do when they hear the siren?

Please be understanding; when you are disturbed by a siren, someone else at TR is in crisis with a medical event or a fire and needs help. When you hear the siren, watch carefully for quickly moving cars and golf carts of our Fire Fighters and First Responders who are going to the Fire Station and/or the location of the emergency. Move safely to the side of the road and allow them to pass.





The company is a licensed registered seller of travel in Florida and has a fleet of a dozen Prevost air conditioned motor coaches operated by courteous professional drivers and equipped with large panoramic windows, public address systems, restrooms, WiFi, electrical plugs, reclining seats and DVD with monitors. The company systematically replaces two older buses per year to provide the latest in comfort and safety. When the travel industry was paralyzed by the onslaught of the COVID pandemic, Small World Tours & Cruises researched and committed to the safest possible air purification system for each of their buses and were able to resume bus transportation tours as early as October 2020. We'll be sharing more information about that in a future article. Even more impressive, this company repaid all trip payments for trips that could not occur during the early months of the pandemic.

•If the trip does not reach its minimum number of travelers one week prior to the scheduled event, your payment will be returned to you in full.

•Payment must be made by check and must be made with American funds.

•All checks will be payable to Small World Tours and given to Sharon Gilbert Zile or Dan Zile, lot 2540. Each check will be for a single trip but may include payment for more than one person.

•Each reservation must have full payment before you are on the "list." Also, this year, a COVID Waiver Form is required for each

•Reservations are transferable, but TR Tour Directors must know before you get on the bus.

•All passengers will wear a mask when loading the bus until 5 minutes after the bus door closes. Also, anytime you are leaving the bus or walking in the aisle, you must wear a mask. (This will all make sense after we share details of the bus's air purification system.) Also, certain venues may require masks - please be pre-

•Activity levels will guide your choices. Activity Level 1 will be appropriate for most TR travelers. Activity Level 2 will include light walking and possibly a flight of stairs. For reference, the Activity Level for the St. John River Cruise is Level 1.

•As each day trip is announced, a colorful promotional flyer will be posted on the Travel Bulletin Board in Busch Hall and on Facebook Residents and Friends. Also, check for travel information in the display case in the Post Office Lobby in December and January.

Library News



Birding Activity







Birding is always underway

by Norm Eden

Our own TR birding trail: The continuing good birding news is that the new nature trail developed by Tom Butler over the past 18 months is working in attracting a wide range of perching/songbird species to the feeders, although some of the stations are seeing much more action than others. This is mostly because apart from liking the food the birds are really choosy about the surrounding habitats and there is no real shortage of food in Florida.

Some of the positions do not pull many birds but time will tell and the plan is off to a very good start. Feedback from the humans is that providing adjacent bench eats at the feeding stations is appreciated and enables folks to sit quietly for a few minutes which is the best way to see more birds. Let us know what you see, particularly if you spot a first time, lifer or an interesting bird you cannot identify. Tom Butler leads the Tuesday morning Bird Walk from the Post Office Veranda at 8 a.m. This is a a good way to see 'what's about' on the trail.

TR bird groups: In recent years well over 100 species have been seen here over the January through March winter season and in some weeks during the 2021-2022 season. Notes will be included covering bird groups that are in our overall listing.

These birds are very specifically referred to as being a 'group' rather than 'families' as most groups include birds from different families. The 'family' is part of the official taxonomic scientific designation that includes the Latin

names and genus, etc; taxonomy being the formal science of species classification that can be quite complex and is best left to the

The first group is the divers: Seven species may be seen at TR, though three of them are relatively uncommon. The common ones include:

The Osprey which with patience can be seen hovering then diving and catching fish. -The Belted Kingfisher

which does the same but is usually too quick for the fish to be seen. -Two more fish eaters who dive before swimming underwater

quickly enough to catch a fish. The Double-crested Cormorant grabs fish prey with a beak having a sharp hook at the

-The Anhinga spears its fish with a dagger sharpened beak. The uncommon ones include:

The Pied-billed Grebe looks like a very small duck but is not in a duck 'family.' It swims very quickly and frequently seems to not surface at all after a dive because it swims a long way and surfaces in undergrowth at the ends of a pond. Like the other two swimmers the grebe has its legs set well back in the body for swimming efficiency so they waddle a lot on land just like the two diving ducks we have seen at

The Bufflehead and the Hooded Merganser are both great birds to see in their breeding plumage but they are uncommon at TR only occasionally stopping here during migration and,

unfortunately, there is a huge number of lakes and ponds for them to settle on in Pasco County.

Best bird: My current best bird is nothing really special or uncommon this week but it could just be an old friend at Vanishing Lake. One lonely little Spotted Sandpiper has steadily been making its way around the water's edge. Staying for weeks it could well be the same single bird we have had wintering here for two maybe three years now in a period when very few other sandpipers have been see at TR. It is a small bird about 7.5 inches long which is not much larger than a a big warbler or sparrow and the winter plumage has no spots. Look for the white breast and patch on the neck as the sandpipers' back is a sandy color making it difficult to see at the water's edge. Once you find the white patch it is diagnostic to note that the bird is constantly teetering or dipping its tail.

But how about your best bird? What are you seeing? Let me know. Has everyone seen the Painted Bunting? Do not forget the Tuesday Bird Walk at 8 a.m. starting at the Post Office Veranda with Tom Butler.






