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2022 AGM is well attended

The 2022 Annual General Meeting was held in The Grove on Tuesday, March 8. Present on the stage were all the current Board Members, Manager Ray Hill and the Board Attorney. Absent was the Board Accountant.

Walt Gilson led the Pledge of Allegiance followed by an Invocation by Chaplain Anthony

Board President Kathy Shawver announced that there was a quorum present, denoting that the meeting was official.

Treasurer Jim Weigand gave an extensive report on the park's finances. He noted that a government small business loan received a couple of years ago, which did not require repayment, placed the park in a position where we were better able to withstand the COVID epidemic. Due to the uncertainty generated by COVID, the Board opted to keep capital expenses to a minimum.

Looking to the future, the Board anticipates employee salaries to increase. They are making every effort to gain and maintain quality workers at a time when wages in general are on the rise. It is also anticipated that there will be an increase in the cost of Pam Watkins

supplies, etc. due to supply chain problems. It is therefore anticipated that next season will generate an overall loss of about \$165,000. These funds will be taken from our current surplus, reducing the surplus to about \$190,000 which was the level of the account several years ago.

Major capital expenses this year included the new pickleball courts. As always, the Board is looking to the future to keep TR financially

Deborah May, Chair of the Nominating Committee, reported that there were four candidates approved to fill the three vacant seats on the Board of Directors. Kathy Shawver made three calls for further nominations from the floor and none were forthcoming.

Sandy Nelson, Head Teller, reported that there were over 500 ballots cast, well over the 334 needed for a quorum. At the close of the meeting


Travelogue resumes next season

The TR Post Office can only take cash or check which means no debit or credit cards. The register is closed at 4 p.m. and the door is locked at 4:30 p.m. If you plan on heading back to your "home away from TR home" you will need to inform the Post Office if there are any changes to your home address. Please make sure we have enough forwarding labels for you. If you do not have labels TR can make them for you for a \$2.50 charge to your existing

When you are ready to come back to TR we have a few recommendations. When doing your mail forwarding we ask you to start it two weeks before your arrival. Then please call the TR Post Office so we may open your box and collect your mail. This will eliminate a few things.

- 1. You will be able to make sure the forwarding request went through and has started when you asked.
- 2. Your mail should be here when you arrive.


Trash talk at TR

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
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The Servant's Plow



Two by two

The closing of our winter season at TR is upon us once again. Some of our residents will make their way back to the "Northern Territories." Some will travel one by one, some two by two.

I remember the planning and course of action my grandfather Don Shipe took for many years to get back and forth from Ohio. I enjoyed travel with him over the years during his eighties. I would help drive the miles much of that time and certainly in his nineties I was deemed the designated driver.

Don had many boxes to pack complete with inventory, lists and some notes scratched in ink on the box tops. There were woodworking tools stashed under the seats in the van. He even plugged in a minirefrigerator in the rear of the van to take items like a half-gallon of milk, salad dressings, meat and cheese for sandwiches. He never let anything go to waste.

One of my favorite stops along the way was Tamarack, W.Va. on I-77. We would use the facilities and sit down to eat a fried green tomato sandwich complete with bacon and cheese. The sandwich was incredible and at last remembrance was about \$13. I would buy Jodie a book or two in the bookshop about ghost stories in the hills, mines of West Virginia or Civil War mysteries. Grandpa was always amazed that at our next stop after the Tamarack, I would fix two peanut butter sandwiches. He said it was wiser to pay me for the drive than buy my food. We had many wonderful thoughtprovoking discussions and a few arguments along our travels. Oh yes, there was plenty of southern gospel for our journey.

Some food for thought on travel, spiritually speaking...

Why did Jesus send out his disciples two by two?

The Gospel writer Mark gives evidence that Jesus designed the ministry of his disciples to be a team effort. Mark wrote, "Then Jesus went around teaching from village to village. Calling the Twelve to him, he began to send them out two by two and gave them authority over impure spirits." (Mark 6:6-7)

Luke also records that Jesus even sent a large group of 72 of his followers out by twos.

"After this the Lord appointed 72 others and sent them two by two ahead of him to every town and place where he was about to go." (Luke 10:1) Why did Jesus do this? Was

there a reason? What was his plan? Here are four strategies of Jesus

to consider. 1. Sending People Two at a Time Is Powerful

Jesus sent his disciples out by twos as a training exercise.

His purpose in sending them out together was for spreading the Good News and growing the Kingdom of God. This teamwork approach shows that people can encourage and empower those they travel with. It is obvious that Jesus used the power of influence, encouragement and mutual learning to train his disciples.

Luke tells about this action of

"One day Jesus called together his 12 disciples and gave them power and authority to cast out all demons and to heal all diseases. Then he sent them out to tell everyone about the Kingdom of God and to heal the sick. "Take nothing for your journey," he instructed them. "Don't take a walking stick, a traveler's bag, food, money or even a change of clothes. Wherever you go, stay in the same house until you leave town. And if a town refuses to welcome you, shake its dust from your feet as you leave to show that you have abandoned those people to their fate." (Luke 9:1-5)

2. The Witness of Two People Is Trustworthy

Two people provide a valid witness. Why is the witness of more than one person important? The Old Testament book of Deuteronomy supports the principles of multiple witnesses.

"A single witness shall not suffice against a person for any crime or for any wrong in connection with any offense that he has committed. Only on the evidence of two witnesses or of three witnesses shall a charge be established." (Deuteronomy 19:15 ESV)

Ínstead of just sending out one person, Jesus created a support system by sending out two disci-

ples together. 3. Working Together by Twos Multiplies Strength

Jesus gave the disciples authority when they worked together.

"Calling the Twelve to him, he began to send them out two by two and gave them authority over impure spirits." (Mark 6:7) They held each other accountable. Jesus' teaching and training is also supported by the book of Ecclesiastes.

"Two are better than one, because they have a good reward for their toil. For if they fall, one will lift up his fellow... and though

a man might prevail against one who is alone, two will withstand him — a threefold cord is not quickly broken." (Ecclesiastes 4:9-12). One might say, I travel alone, but when you travel with God, two are present.

4. Supporting Each Other By Twos Is Rewarding

Jesus showed that sending the disciples out by twos helped them to support one another in the things they witnessed and the observation of many miracles. God's fingerprints are all around us as we travel the highways and byways.

A powerful story about supporting one another can be found in the Old Testament book of Exodus. The Israelites were in a battle with Amalek. Moses was commanded by God to stand on the mountainside and hold his hands upward toward heaven.

The Amalekites came and attacked the Israelites at Rephidim. Moses said to Joshua, "Choose some of our men and go out to fight the Amalekites. Tomorrow I will stand on top of the hill with the staff of God in my hands."

So, Joshua fought the Amalekites as Moses had ordered, and Moses, Aaron and Hur went to the top of the hill. As long as Moses held up his hands, the Israelites were winning, but whenever he lowered his hands, the Amalekites were winning. When Moses' hands grew tired, they took a stone and put it under him, and he sat on it. Aaron and Hur held his hands up — one on one side, one on the other — so that his hands remained steady till sunset. So, Joshua overcame the Amalekite army with the sword." (Exodus 17:8-13)

Well, the 2021-2022 season of The TR Times is complete! Soon many will be headed back to their summer home. Of course, I always write about travel safety and I will do that again. The difference this year is that we continue to stay, travel, or go to our summer home under the potential cloud of new COVID-19 variants. Some have gotten their vaccine and boosters, others have not; some states are lifting restrictions, others not so much.

The SAFETY message is to "Be Safety Conscious" when you move about - whether you are in a golf cart, on a bicycle, or in a car, in the park or on your way to your summer home. Don't let an accident sneak up on you!

As you travel on the highways, it is always a challenge to stay alert, deal with road congestion and construction and avoid other crazy drivers on the road. As you deal with other drivers who drive erratically, text, or are inattentive, it is a great idea to let your passen-

ger answer your phone, handle text messages and do the navigation. Whether you are driving, with or without an RV, devote your full attention to the road.

Also, be sure that you are alert and rested for every mile you drive. Stop every hour or so and walk around for a few minutes. A little exercise keeps blood from pooling in your legs and improves mental acuity as well. Avoid heavy meals on the road that make you sleepy at the wheel, but don't skip meals which can lead to low blood sugar and potential trouble. If you find vour attention wandering, you start yawning, or notice other signs that you need a break - take one! It is likely that a few minutes of rest over the long haul of your trip will not be a problem. Finally, plan your travel days to allow for leisurely meals and restful overnight stops and share driving with another driver if possible. Retirement is precious – don't risk your safety on the road.

The WELLNESS message is "Be Well – Stay Well." Please be smart when you travel home. When you stop at a rest area, gas station, restaurant, campground or motel, you may be exposed to the COVID-19 virus. We know folks, including you, can be COVID positive and contagious, feel fine and not know they can spread the

Don't let your guard down. Wear your mask. Exercise "social distance" of 6 feet from others. Cleanse your hands after contacting surfaces or wear disposable gloves. In motels, wipe down doorknobs, TV controls, light switches, sink and tub hardware and other frequently touched areas as soon as you check in. Take your own pillow and several pillowcases so you can change between stays. Leave your personal items in suitcases or plastic bags. Remove yourself from the presence of anyone who appears to be ill. If you are nervous about eating in a restaurant, eat on the patio, or order a meal to carry out and eat in your motel or camper. If you have to shop, do it very early or very late when customers are

Finally, if you do become ill while you are traveling, seek emergency care if your fever, cough or sore throat is accompanied by shortness of breath. If you think you have been exposed to COVID, wait 3 to 5 days and test, wearing a mask and staying away from folks (and family) until you are sure you don't have COVID.

Drive Smart - Stay Well -Arrive Alive and Healthy!! Have fun this summer and be safe. See you in the fall! We can't sign off for the season without a discussion of butterflies. Lake Margaret Garden, otherwise known as TR Garden, has two registered Monarch Waystations. Several TR residents have planted milkweed and nectar plants to provide food and shelter for Monarch Butterflies. Monarchs are ecologically important because they pollinate food crops and ornamentals.

An article in the Sept. 21, 2021 issue of The New York Times describes a surprising behavior of milkweed butterflies, a category that includes Monarch Butterflies. Milkweed butterflies eat their young. Two young men, a graduate student studying insects and a naturalist have documented this behavior with photographs published in a scientific journal, Ecology, according to this article.

Milkweed butterflies have claws on their feet which they use to scratch their own caterpillars in order to consume their bodily fluids. Some caterpillars survive this predation. Will you ever look at Monarch Butterflies in the same way as you did before reading this?

This year we have gone to Brooksville and learned much of its history through two Adventure Labs. We also found two regular caches and had a fantastic lunch at the Coney Island Hot Dog Restaurant. That was a treat in itself.

Our next adventure took us to Ybor City where we did an Adventure Lab and an Earth Cache in a cold, light rain. Lawrence Northway was amazed that there were chickens in the street. It

reminded him of Key West. Our lunch stop was the Columbia Restaurant, which has been a family-owned and operated restaurant since 1905. Lawrence loved both the Cuban sandwich and our waiter dressed in tails. Birding Activity









Good birding for all at TR and 'did you know?'

The birds to be seen at TR are an ever-changing feast. Although the winter season will all too quickly be over, the Tuesday morning walks with Tom Butler, at 8 a.m. from the Post Office Veranda, will continue through April. Tom will still be birding during the summer and you can contact him for details or bird information at 863-651-7526 and at lot 14-07.

This winter has been a great success as an enlarged group of Tuesday walkers has recorded several really interesting 'bestbirds.' Hopefully many of the walkers will also have recorded a few personal first-time sightings or 'lifers.' Notable has been the Ovenbird an unusual warbler, the Orchard Oriole an uncommon to rare bird in this part of Florida and another distinctive warbler the Northern Parula. Many thanks and much appreciation is due Tom Butler for creating, developing and maintaining the new birding trail with feeders in strategic locations, and did you know?

TR winter sightings are now an amazing 120 species and the renowned Cornell University Laboratory notes us as a birding hotspot with the potential to record 150+ species!

One of the most valuable books in the world is a bird guide as the last sale of a copy was over \$11 million!

Birds of America was originally published in parts as a series between 1827 and 1838. Written and illustrated by John James Audubon just 120 copies are known to exist. The National

Audubon Museum is on the Ohio River in Hendersonville, Ky., just over the bridge from Evansville in Southwest Indiana. It is in a small State Park with a nice campground. Well worth a visit if you are within reach as there is a copy of his book there. Audubon lived in that area for some years.

Nuthatches are the only birds that can walk frontwards down a tree. Woodpeckers, creepers and some warblers that feed on insects in tree bark all start at a low point and work their way up.

Hummingbirds can fly backwards.

Bald Eagles are not perfect parents like our Sandhill Cranes. When the young Eagles fledge and are ready to fly, they fall or fly from the nest, and the parents then ignore them. The juvenile has to learn how to hunt and some attach themselves to the local Vulture group who find the carrion for them. Others sometime starve to

Some birds migrate by walking! In California the Mountain Quail spends most of the time foraging and generally living in small flocks on the ground of the high Sierras. Then in the fall when

temperatures start dropping it walks down the mountain a little more each day until reaching the lower levels for winter. A ranger told me this but not whether the birds walk or fly back up the mountain in spring.

The only endemic - not found anywhere else - Florida bird species is the Scrub-Jay. It is not at all easy to find as the population has reduced due to habitat erosion and it is now a vulnerable species.

Hummingbirds are special. Apart from wing speed and the ability to fly backwards a human would have to eat around 280 lbs. of meat per day to match the metabolic rate of a Hummingbird! The Sword-billed Hummingbird has a beak that is longer than its body because it has to get nectar from deep inside trumpet-type passion flowers in the South American Andes Mountains.

Guard Ducks. Some ducks can sleep with just one eye open and working so they are positioned around the flock and then they quack when the open eye registers something!

The Californian Condor has a wingspan of up to 9.5 feet. They have been mistaken as small aircraft.

Owls cannot swivel their eyes but can turn their heads 180 degrees, in either direction, to see behind them.

There are more fake Flamingoes in the world than real ones.

Some people suffer from, Anatidaephobia - which means they believe a duck or goose is constantly watching them causing anxiety problems. Good birding over the summer and fall!

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
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
