Communication expands at first Resident Forum

President Deborah May opened the meeting by introducing the seven Board members, the General Manager, the Office Manager and the Sergeant-at-Arms that were in attendance. She noted that the Treasurer was not able to attend.

The park staff was busy this summer and completed many projects. The key card system is completed along with the tennis courts and pickleball courts. The golf course is slated to be completed by the end of November.

The Resident Dashboard on travelersrestresort.com has been expanded to include InTouchLink app access, board meeting minutes, non-disclosure agreements (NDAs) and communications from the board.

The committee appointed to review the current confidentiality agreements has completed the review. The six page confidentiality agreements have been converted to two-page NDAs.

At the end of October 2023 all park leases were paid except for two. The park currently has over \$67,000 more in reserve than at this time last year.

President May explained that a budget is designed as an estimate of how funds will be used within the corporation. This year's budget has incurred the unexpected costs for repairs from a lightning strike and treatment for lethal bronzing disease that is prevalent in the park's palm trees.

An audit of TR's finances is currently being conducted by an

outside company. It has been determined that the audit will include the Activities funds this year.

As president of the current board, Deborah May is committed to limiting the use of the attorneys. Legal fees are rising. The board will need to have the attorneys settle a permitting issue with Pasco County.

The nominating committee will determine how the proxy votes will be divided between the candidates.

The following questions and comments were presented by audience members and addressed by the board:

-How much was paid in lawyer fees last year?

With the current audit in progress the amount is unknown but should be on the financial statement when it is completed.

-Is it possible for the board to sell TR without having the sale voted on by the stockholders?

President May stated that the stockholders would have to vote on a sale.

-Another resident questioned whether a vote by stockholders was needed to sell any amount of the park.

An audience member read the policy that states that 15 percent of TR can be sold without shareholder vote and that Florida Statutes do not have a policy stating that shareholders have to be given a chance to vote to sell the corporation. Per the current Bylaws, the board currently has the power to sell the park without input from the shareholder. Florida Statutes Statutes are very broad regarding this issue. The resident would like to have the current Bylaws updated to limit the power of the board.

-What corporation does TR invest with?

Charles Schwab where funds are in a money market account and rotating CDs.

-A delivery driver stopped and asked a resident if they would open the restroom door as they are now locked. The resident did let the driver into the restroom but was concerned if it was acceptable to do so.

President May said that it is up to the individual as to how they would handle such a situation.

-A resident congratulated the board on opening up communication.

-Several residents presented questions regarding background checks being done in the future, for residents, people purchasing stock and employees?

-A resident requested that everyone reflect on what "type" of person would be deemed acceptable after a background check.

The board will survey shareholders in the future and review the possibility of doing background checks.

-Employees currently do not have health insurance. Given that TR currently has a larger reserve of funds will health insurance be offered to employees?

The Board will conduct a survey and review the option.

-Is there an issue with current park models and permitting?

The permit issue pertains to new units coming into the park.

-A former board member commented on the employee health insurance issue. In the past, employees were given a pay increase that could be used to purchase health insurance. With the upcoming repairs that will need to be completed, employee health insurance will be investigated as an option.

Activities Director Guy Weik offered the following: If you do not see an activity on this month's calendar it is most likely not starting yet. Many activities or events are happening in the next few weeks.

Congratulations to Richard and Amy Peebles on a successful 1st Flea Market. They have taken over for the Gilsons. A Flea Market will be held on the first Saturday of the month thru March and a Yard Sale will be held on the 3rd Saturday of the month.

Veranda Chats will be on the 3rd Monday of the month at 3 p.m. on the Veranda in front of Busch Hall.

A beacon of welcome is rebuilt!

Back in 2007 Sam Scime built a lighthouse that was placed on the Golf Course near Johnston Road. From the beginning the Florida climate caused problems. Although the original was built of cypress wood, heat, moisture and condensation were not kind to the structure. Over the years Rich Matkovich, Don Clark and Jay Matthews have struggled to keep the lighthouse intact. It was





was made by Don Clark so that they could accomplish that part of the project. At his home base back in Paradise, Pa. Don was able to piece together all the parts that make up the top structure.

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eventually totally reconstructed and changed from an 8-foot structure to one over 12-feet tall. It was also moved to a new location to make it more visible.

This past year the crew took down the entire structure and did a major overhaul. Did vou know that the lighthouse's design copied that of the Hatteras Lighthouse except for the very top? The new structure is made of more durable material that will hopefully withstand the Florida climate.

In a recent interview with Matkovich he reported the following: "The complete rebuild of the lighthouse includes mounting it ³/₄-inch above the concrete base so that air can get under it. A 4-inch hole has been bored from top to bottom. The new top structure is a totally new design thanks to Don Clark, with a fan that operates 24 hours a day to help draw the air up thru the structure.

Located at the top are (12)1-inch vents to help the moisture and heat to escape. The top structure consists of PVC and marine plywood. All materials are double-primed, double-painted and covered with Flexseal rubberized paint. The three windows have also been rebuilt with new windows and curtains. A custom-made 4-inch boring tool



Buy/Sell in Place or Sell-on-Site Policy

It is wonderful to see so many people back already this season. The turnout for the Thanksgiving meal in Busch Hall was around 150 people. The food was spectacular. What great cooks we have here. The TR game was based on interesting facts (many I didn't know) about Travelers Rest. A special thanks to Beanie Wise and Pat Butler for organizing this event. A special thanks also to all the workers who set up and took down the tables, chairs and decorations. What would we do without our volunteers!

One of the most misunderstood Travelers Rest Resort Policies is the Buy/Sell in Place or Sell-on-Site Policy D7010. Basically, it means that if you live in RV South or the Cabana section and you want to sell your unit and have the buyer be able to leave it on the lot and lease the lot, you must pay \$100 a year beginning when you first move it on the lot. If you did not pay the \$100 fee and the buyer wants the lot you must go back and pay the fee from the first day forward. If you have been there for five years you must pay \$500 if you have not already paid it annually. Without the fee being paid, if you sell your unit it must

be removed from the lot. The lot then is available to someone on the waiting list or it is given to a current leaseholder who has requested that lot under Policy D3110-D3115. If a unit being sold is 10 years old or older, they must meet the requirements of D4012 before it can be sold on site. Any units that have an approved free-standing screen room are required to pay the Sell-on-Site fee automatically (D6285).

Under Policy D3655 Park Model Site Fees the \$100 fee is applied to all park model sites and all Cabana sites that have a Cabana on them. This fee is included automatically on the yearly lease billing for these sites.

O1042 STOCKHOLDER MEETING ANNUAL PACKET. It is the responsibility of the Board First Vice President or duly appointed Board Member to prepare the Annual Meeting Packets for mailing. Preparation of the packet for notification of Annual Stockholders Meeting should begin by Dec. 15 each year.

Changes

A1040 STOCKHOLDER MEETING ELECTION INSPECTOR: Responsibilities of the Election Inspector are to assist the Board First Vice President in _preparing the Annual Meeting Packets for mailing, setting up Busch Hall for the meeting, supervising the registration of attending stockholders, advising the meeting Chairman when a quorum exists so the meeting may be called to order, voting the proxy ballots held by the Board of Directors and maintaining an accurate tally of proxy ballot votes and floor votes.

O2005 STOCKHOLDER MEETING RESPONSIBILITY: It is the responsibility of the First Vice President of the Board, or duly appointed Board Member, and the Election Inspector to see that the detailed work required to prepare for the meeting and to carry out the registration and voting procedures, before and during the meeting, are carried out in a timely manner. This includes the preparation of the packet for notifications of the Annual Stockholders' Meeting and should begin by December 15 each year.

O3025: STOCKHOLDER MEETING PREPARATION: The following are the combined duties of the Board First Vice president, or duly appointed Board Member, and Election Inspector in preparing for the meeting.

O3025-2: After mailing the Annual Meeting packet and before the Annual Meeting, the Election Inspector will maintain a file of the proxy ballots received. This file will be stored in the file safe in the TR Office. All proxy ballot envelopes will be opened in the presence of at least 2 other people. O6040 USHERS: Ushers will oversee the registration lines. The Ushers will collect ballots and assist with other procedures as needed and directed by the Head Teller Election Inspector.

Policy Changes approved 5-23-23

Changed to read: D3610: HUD AND ANSI APPROVED MANUFACTURERS AND DEALERS: Manufacturers and Dealers must meet Pasco County Requirements and the TR basic package requirements. Prior to ordering a unit, stockholders must have Manufacturer and Dealer approved by Management and/or Board of Directors.

Delete D3615: PARK MODEL APPROVED DEALERS

Changed to read: E2030: PET EXERCISE FACILITY: There are two pet exercise facilities at Travelers Rest. The primary facility is located in RV South at the corner of 14th Avenue and 10th Street. The second facility is located on the north side of the Citrus Building. Adhere to posted hours of operations and follow posted regulations. These facilities are maintained by the Pet Lovers Club and Travelers Rest.

Changed to read: C3030 SIGNS WITHIN TRAVELERS REST: A "For Sale" sign no larger than 11" x 14" may be placed on the front and on the patio fence/screen of units within the resort. A normal "Real Estate" type "For Sale" sign may be placed in the front yard of a Village Home. Businesses working in the park may have a sign up for the duration of their project with approval of park management or BOD. No general advertising signs are permitted.

N2060 PRODCEDURES FOR ENFOREMENT OF RULES AND REGULATIONS.

#2 To ensure compliance with the Rules and Regulations, Shareholders and/or Lessess, may be fined not less than \$10.00 \$35 nor more than \$100.00 \$150.

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
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The Servant's Plow

A living sacrifice to God

Paul is writing a letter to the Church in Rome, one of his most lengthy Epistles, explaining the principles of Christian living. He begins the 12th Chapter, "Dear brothers and sisters," (depending on which translation you have), "I plead or I urge or I appeal to you... to give your bodies to God or offer your bodies as living sacrifices." Interestingly, when you go to the HarperCollins Bible Dictionary and look up the word "sacrifice" it tells you to look under "worship." That led me to look deeper into the concepts of sacrifice and worship, what they meant in Jesus' time and what they might mean today.

Remember that Paul, the author of this Epistle, was born Saul and was educated and raised as a Pharisee before he was converted by an encounter with the risen Christ. Paul understood the theology of Jesus the Messiah.

Because of who Jesus was and what He means to us, Paul "appeals" to all Christians, by the mercies of God. The word that the NLT Bible translates as "plead," is translated elsewhere as "urge" or even "appeal." The point of the word is exhortation. Paul is urging the Roman Christians to be serious in their commitment to God. He is like a coach who wants the greatest possible performance out of his team. He exhorts them, by the mercy of God, to present their bodies as a "HOLY" living sacrifice.

The idea of sacrifice has been around as long as humanity has. Sacrifice has always been part of the human worship of God whether a god or the one true God of Israel or any other deity worshiped by people. As early as Chapter 4 of Genesis, we read a story of Cain and Abel making acrificial offerings to the Lord. Able was a shepherd and brings before God the best of the lambs from his flocks. Cain was a farmer and brought the best of the grain grown from his fields. Just for trivia... why did God accept Able's sacrifice and not Cains? Because... Cain's sacrifice was from the "cursed ground" and the lamb that Able brought was a life that God created in the womb. From that story through the stories of Abraham giving the best he had to God when God came to visit his camp, through the story of Abraham being willing to sacrifice his beloved son Isaac (another life that God created in the womb) on the altar before God. We have story after story of sacrifice as a part of worship.

Leviticus and Numbers, Moses' brother Aaron and the house of the Levites was trained in the ways of Priestly worship and sacrifice. Cattle, sheep, goats, doves and pigeons became the sacrificial animals of our ancient faith. By the time that King Solomon built the first Temple in Jerusalem, the Priests had perfected the art of sacrifice greatly.

In the Temple, there were several different kinds of sacrifices, each involving different animals and offered for different reasons. The burnt offering was the most common and most general of sacrifices. Any kind of animal could be used, as long as it was male and free of blemishes and it was ritually killed, prepared and burned on the altar. (The burning sacrifice took the prayers skyward and brought a "pleasing aroma" to God, which is why some churches continue to use incense in services today.) The sacrifice could be offered as thanksgiving or in atonement and was done twice a day, every day, in the Temple in Jerusalem. In addition to this twice daily sacrifice, there were peace offerings, thank offerings, freewill offerings, votive offerings, sin offerings and ordination offerings.

Each of them has a purpose. One of the sacrifices offered by the Temple Priests did not season at TR. involve killing an animal or using its blood as a part of the rite. On one of the High Holy Days, the Day of Atonement (Yom Kippur), the High Priest would take one of the male goats destined for sacrifice. Because this was a sacrificial animal, it would be as close to perfect as they could get. The Priest would take this perfect goat and say prayers in which he would lay all of the sins of the people on the goat. Then the goat was run off into the countryside, where it would presumably take the sins of the people with it. Do you see where this is headed? By the way, this sacrifice of the goat on Yom Kippur is where we get the modern term "scapegoat," for one who takes the blame for another's wrongdoing.

Jesus "offered himself, in obedience to God's plan, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world... for the remission of sins." That is the way Paul understood Jesus' crucifixion, as a perfect sacrifice, as the ultimate act of atonement for the sins of the whole world under the New Covenant. To Paul, and to most of the modern Church, Jesus' sacrifice on the cross was the perfected version of a lamb without blemish being laid on the altar in the Temple.

So, when Paul tells the Roman Church that they are to present their bodies to God as a holy and living sacrifice, he didn't mean that they should be ritually killed in the name of God. Paul meant that they were to offer their hearts, souls, minds and bodies, in other words their entirety, to God.

Today, we are still called by God, just as the Church in Rome was almost 2,000 years ago, to offer to God everything we have as a sacrificial offering to the Lord because of our blessings or the mercies that God has given us. In our modern understanding that means the "Three T's" our time, our talents and our treasure or our tithes and offerings.

In the coming weeks, a new worship season is upon us again here at TR. This theme of our need to sacrificially give is going to re-emerge several times. As those weeks and those sermons come around, I want you to keep a couple of things in mind. First, we do not give our offerings because God needs it or because the Church needs it. This is about our need to give sacrificially to God because of how He has blessed us. Believers here at TR always bring their talents, their time and their treasures. Think about how you give of your time and how you use your God-given talents. Blessings to you at the beginning of this new

To those who have found their way back to our beloved Travelers Rest, "welcome back!" It is exciting to see familiar faces as well as new ones arriving. Fire/Rescue is here to serve our residents in any way we can.

There is some information we would like to make available to everyone to keep you informed about our services. Every Tuesday at 10:30 a.m. First Responders will be at the Fire Station to perform blood pressures and blood sugar tests. Tuesday, Dec. 4 there will be a Blood Drive. First Responders will be there to supply juices and snacks.

A word on the sirens: When you dial 911 there will be a steady blast for one minute, activated by Pasco County Rescue. If there is an emergency in the park there will be five warbling blasts which is activated by the red button on the front of the Fire Station. This DOES NOT ACTIVATE the 911 System. It does alarm the First Responders in the park who will go to the Fire Station. Please remain at the Fire Station to inform the First Responders of the emergency. Every Tuesday at 9 a.m. the siren is tested and you will hear two blasts. For Tornado or Hurricane warnings there will be three long blasts for 15 seconds. Listening to local tv/radio will keep you posted on up-to-date information.

Sunday evenings a Vial of Life is available in Busch Hall before the entertainment for those who do not have one. These have a piece of paper with vital health information on it that we ask you to fill out and place in the provided vial on the door in your refrigerator for easy access in the event of an emergency.

For those with propane the Firemen have a "Sniffer" in the event of a leak. Do not hesitate to contact someone to verify if there is a leak.

Everyone should be cognizant of placing house numbers in front of your homes making it easy for Fire Rescue to find you.

A reminder, if you see the TR Medcart please move over and let it pass.

Healthy Tips

Welcome back to TR! I am pleased to be a part of *The TR* Times' staff again this year and to be able to write these articles for you. Every year I find myself asking what can I write about this year? Generally it can be challenging for me to write on health topics that may be informative and useful to you.

Thankfully, this first article was relatively easy for me. Because the first TR Blood Drive will be held on Monday, Dec. 4, I decided to use this event as a theme for this article. My husband Ken is the chairperson of this event and he will provide more information regarding the Blood Drive in this TR Times.

Although all blood is made of the same basic elements, not all blood is alike. Basically there are four blood groups: Group A, Group B, Group AB and Group O. These are determined by the presence or absence of certain substances (A & B antigens) on the surface of red blood cells. A third antigen is called the Rh factor. The Rh factor can be present (+) or

negative (-). Based on these groups and antigens, there are eight blood types.

Since some antigens can trigger a patient's immune system to attack transfused blood, safe blood transfusions depend on accurate blood typing and crossmatching. Donated blood is carefully processed and analyzed to determine the group and Rh factor, followed by testing for infectious diseases. Following testing, the suitable blood units are then properly labeled and stored for subsequent transfusions. Blood has three components each of which has a specific use for the recipient. RED BLOOD CELLS are given to surgery and trauma patients and those with blood disorders (ex. anemia).

PLATELETS control clotting and can be used for cancer or surgical patients. PLASMA also carries clotting factors and is given to trauma patients, organ transplant recipients and patients with clogging disorders.

So what blood type can be donated and then be transfused to whom? I found the chart above and found it not only easy to read, but very informative.

Per TR First Responder Lise Minnick, the TR Fire/Rescue Station will be open and manned during the 8 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. blood-drive time. You are encouraged to stop by after donating for a few minutes of rest, hydration and conversation with a First Responder and your blood-donating TR neighbors. Please remember, we are a 55+ community; although giving blood is safe for seniors, our bodies react differently to sudden blood loss than when we were younger. Take a few minutes at the Fire/Rescue Station after donating. I personally found out the hard way. A few minutes of rest and plenty of hydration may be needed.

Bacterium inside the gut of palm frond "tree hoppers" invaded the three majestic palms on First Street and one on the Golf Course. They had to be cut and carried away. Sad, but true; deaths are predicted for Florida's many varieties of iconic palms. The bacterium destroys the vascular tissue of the plant. Fronds become reddish brown and within three to four months the crown goes from umbrella-like to pear shaped and scruffy and the tree hoppers move on.

Gloom and doom.....? The University of Florida Agriculture Service (UF/ IFAS) reports possible protection by treating unaffected palms with an antibiotic four times a year. This can be done inexpensively by purchasing a kit that includes the drug in powder form, syringe, drill bit and valve to treat 30 trees. Recent purchases were \$75 per kit. Go to www. palmtreesaver.com. TR has pur-

What floor would you like?

This is a question we have heard many times when we step into an elevator. If you were in the company of a variety of birds, you would hear a variety of different answers. Imagine a grocery store with multiple floors offering different food selections. When it comes to wooded areas, every tree is divided into different floors - I mean levels. Each level, top to bottom, creates a mosaic of habitats and dietary offerings that provide what is essential for each type of bird. While we can find each bird at different levels, each species has a personal favorite. Let's start on the ground floor and see what is available.

Forest Floor: This is the recycling station for decaying leaves, fallen trees, animal scat, moss and detritus. These waste items are broken down by fungi, insects of many descriptions and earthworms (a bird favorite). Insects and seeds attract doves of all descriptions as well as wrens, thrushes, robins and many species of sparrows. The Ovenbird, a warbler species, not only spends most of its time on the forest floor feeding, it builds its nest on the ground in the shape of a pizza oven. Insects on my pizza - no thank you. How about we check out the second floor?

Herb Layer: Herbaceous or soft-stemmed plants as well as grasses, ferns, flowers and various ground covers are found here. These plants and flowers attract additional examples of insects and, in turn, more species of birds with just a little different dietary demand. The mere addition of flowers, at this level, creates an ample supply of seeds and nectar

that bring in many newcomers to this floor - err layer. Hummingbirds seek out tubular flowers for the energy-giving nectar while Goldfinches flock to Purple Cone flowers, Zinnias and Thistle plants. Warblers of many descriptions enjoy the seeds found at this level. Yum! Let's push the button for the next floor.

Shrub Layer: Woody-stemmed vegetation makes up the next level. With bushes, brambles and berry-producing plants, this is a very different food source and, therefore, another change in species that flock to this layer. Flock is the perfect word for Cedar Waxwings because they are a very social bird that stays in large groups and descend onto just about any source of berries. When cool weather descends on the woods there is a decrease in the number insects available. Many birds including Bluebirds, Yellowrumped Warblers and our state bird the Northern Mockingbird turn to a variety of fruits that becomes available. Beauty Berries are found in our park and are a favorite of these incredible creatures. Next floor up, please.

Understory: This level consists of smaller trees, saplings and immature trees that have not yet reached the upper canopy level. This layer provides food, shelter and protection from larger predators such as hawks and owls that frequent the canopy above. Nearly a third of migratory birds frequent the understory level which makes us realize that we need to search higher levels with our binoculars. Looking at bird feeders is great, but you may be missing additional species if you don't search all levels of the habitat. Many of these trees are larval hosts which means that insects lay eggs on leaves that will provide food when they emerge. More insects, larvae and caterpillars can only mean one thing - more birds! Grosbeaks, Tanagers, Orioles and Cuckoos can be seen on a regular basis when viewing this level. Next floor please.

Canopy: This level is where the crowns of trees meet to form a thick layer. Much like an umbrella, wildlife are provided some shade, wind and rain protection as well as an abundance of fruits and nuts. In a rainforest you would likely find nearly half of all the wildlife residing at this level. Parrots are common in the rainforest while our canopy has a different cast of characters. Owls and Hawks love to perch on the large branches in our park and peer down on the food sources available before making their dining selection. Yikes! Wood Ducks, Black-bellied Whistling Ducks and others use these branches to roost at night. Last stop on our ascent coming up.

Emergent Level: Trees that penetrate the canopy, or emerge, provide incredible observation perches for some of the larger predators like an Eagle. When perched near water, the Eagle has a bird's-eye view of fishing opportunities. Other large predatory birds will feed on mammals, reptiles and birds that frequent the canopy below. A place for everyone! So, as we descend back down to the forest floor, check your shopping list and decide what tasty morsels and snacks you just can't live without. You should be able to find yourself something scrumptious.

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

This week I thought I might address safety on the golf course. We all want to enjoy our time on the course and so I thought I might point out some safety related issues for your consideration.

1. When teeing off it is always a good idea to ensure the players ahead of you are far enough ahead. Given the fact that we play on an executive-style short course, it is generally recommended you not hit your ball off the tee box until players ahead of you are near or on the green. No one appreciates an anxious golfer who drives his/her ball at the heels of their shoes. I have rarely experienced this, but the few times I have, it is unsettling and truly not appreciated.

2. When hitting your ball from the tee box or on the fairway, should the ball head over to the adjacent fairway whether you see other golfers or not, I would suggest that you yell "fore." It may not be necessary but as a precaution it could avoid an unfortunate accident. I have been out twice this year where a ball came over the trees from #7 to #8. Both times the person driving the ball wasn't quite sure where the ball went or did not see us and said nothing.



How far can we walk or bike in TR?

Have you decided to exercise more by walking or biking? These distances will help you create a route to meet your goal.

1.Doggie Walk Loop: Beginning at the TR entrance, walk west along the perimeter grass path (the doggie walk), down to the Puppy Park, to the Snack Shack, past Lake Margaret to the Fire Station...1.35 miles.


2.RV South Loop: From TR Blvd. and 14th Street intersection down to 10th, over to 21st, down 2nd, and back to 14th Street....0.93 mile.

3.Cabanas Loop: Go west from intersection at TR Blvd. and 11^{th} Street down around to 13^{th} and back east to TR Blvd....0.50 mile.

4.Village Loop: Go around the outside perimeter of the Village beginning at the intersection of Maple and Oak Hill Avenues near Oakview and ending at the intersection of Busch Lane and Oak Hill Avenue....0.90 mile.

Combine the longer perimeter routes and you can walk/bike over 2.5 miles.

3. One way to speed up the game and possibly avoid the frustration of an impatient golfer behind you is to ensure that once you have hit go directly to your ball. As you approach your ball determine the club you will need and be ready to hit when it is your turn. I have witnessed several occasions where all the golfers in a foursome converge around the ball of one golfer which inevitably slows the game down.

4. As mentioned in my previous article, remember to play "ready" golf at all times. That means if there are players in the foursome that might need a little more time or might be searching for a ball, the golfer that is ready to play should do so. This method of golf helps speed up the process and at the same time gives the person who might need a little more time the opportunity to do so.

5. Once you are on the green and have finished putting, immediately move on to the next tee box. This will keep you safely out of firing range of any golfer behind you that is driving for the green you have just left. Scores can be calculated and recorded at the next hole. Remember safety first.

6. Also, remember that wherever there is a body of water there is potentially an alligator. Hole #3 is usually where we are most likely to see one. However, they can show up elsewhere. The best advice is to maintain a wide berth around these guys. Being a northerner I don't know much about alligators but from what I have read they can move pretty fast if they so choose.

7. Duffers Deck when finishing #9 serves a very important purpose. When you finish putting please take advantage of the protection Duffers Deck offers. I have seen and heard of several people being hit by a golf ball because they were standing partially in the clearing between the two fences. The safest place is clearly inside Duffers Deck. Standing by the sidewalk would be second best. These are simple common sense safety recommendations that will make your golfing experience at our little oasis in the sun an experience to remember.
