
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TR Church Association plans new office trailer

Several years ago the Church's Board of Directors began looking for a way to provide a better space for the pastor to do his work beyond the regular Sunday Church Services. The current location in the Cabana Section provided few comforts, including not having a restroom. It was becoming a storage room with the front space being a collection center for donations to Daystar and Sunrise, and it was hardly a space to console grieving family members or others in their time of need.

After many months of searching for the best choice that would satisfy the Church's needs for the foreseeable future and conform to outside and internal rules and regulations, a specially built 36-ft. trailer was chosen. It will have a built-in wheelchair lift and be wheelchair accessible throughout. The unit will have three slide-outs, a meeting room, kitchen, spacious half-bath and a separate pastor's office. All this comes at a price. All inclusive, set-up and ready to go, we have a \$85,000 budget.



Within the rules of the park the only unit we can place next to the Church Cabana has to be a titled recreational vehicle. No park model or similar unit is acceptable. To lower the capital investment, we looked at the many travel trailers, destination trailers and fifth wheel units on the open market but with these we lost handicap accessibility. We also lost operational amenities like a residential type of sewage system and floor plans that work.

The unit we chose best fits all our needs without having to make adaptations.

The current Church Cabana will remain in place and become a depot for Daystar and Sunrise contributions. The current shed on the property will be relocated to the park's storage area behind Maintenance. It will be used to store the rapidly increasing supply of Church possessions.

It is hoped that Church members will support this venture with their contributions. Even small contributions from many members will make this a reality.

Let's talk about plastic bags and plastic film. Bags have many uses. Unfortunately, most bags are single-use and thus pose a huge problem worldwide. They are a major part of the eight million tons of plastic that end up in our oceans

Bags come in many sizes. Some are small and some are big and some have handy draw

The larger ones are useful for transporting your recyclables to the bins and can be reused for this and other purposes. The really big black ones can hold a lot of garbage. Plastic film is also common and useful for wrapping

None of these product groups are recycled in Pasco County and they are a major contaminant in processing recyclables. Many cities, towns and municipalities in North America are in fact banning single use plastic bags.

Sub-leasing of site by lessee

TR Board of Directors Mother Nature has been throwing a variety of weather patterns at us recently. The wind, rain and threat of tornadoes in our area is not a typical January here at TR. While we may have our ups and downs in temperature here, they are temperatures are certainly better than being at home in the north. They, too, have had unusual weather patterns for the year with more snow already than they have received in the past couple of

When I left home on Jan. 5 to start back to TR it was 29 degrees and snowing. When I arrived here it felt wonderful at 64 degrees. It's always great to get back to our "little piece of paradise," see old friends and make new ones.

A lessee who for one reason or another will not be occupying their site for a specific period of

time (weeks, months or season) can go to the Office and sign a Sub-leasing Authorization Form. This form must be executed and signed by both TR Management and the site sub-lessee. This will then authorize the Office to sublease the site. (D3905)

There are a few rules that must

be observed in order to do this. Any RV must be removed from the site. The Sub-leasing Authorization Form is a binding contract that is non-cancelable for the period designated and cannot be rescinded. During the sub-lease period, the lessees forfeit and transfer all of their privileges to the sub-lessee. (The shed is not allowed to be sub-leased.) The Office shall handle all details of the sub-lease, including approval of sub-lessee and collection of rent. The rent shall be shared as 65% to site-lessee and 35% to the Corporation. Any charges for electricity are the responsibility of the lessee. The lot must be vacated (RV removed) at the end of the sub-lease. (D3910)

All sub-lessees must adhere to the TR Rules and Regulations including pet regulations and site cleanliness and appearance. Please remember that any unit for sale shall not be sub-leased or rented.

Just happened to find Ray after he finished enjoying a delicious breakfast sandwich now available in Busch Hall on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Hopefully TR folks will find the offerings to their taste and make this a big success. Steve D's Philly Cheesesteaks gives five percent of the proceeds to support the weekly Coffee Social and also makes certain the Busch Hall facilities are left sparkling clean.

The new sturdy, steel, flatbed trailer is being readied for events. There will be a quiet generator and canopies installed making it useful

wherever it is needed in the park. The trailer is goodsized, measuring 8.5x30 ft. and will be kept in storage. When needed it takes only about 30 minutes for setup making it easily available as a stage for Friday Afternoon Live or any event throughout the park.

Touching on the Village road issue Ray addressed the concern regarding the old road grindings being used for paths and parking areas and assured me there are no restrictions that would prevent such use.

As Ray and I discussed the roads and the relationship TR enjoys with the county, it made me wonder why the Board of Directors has chosen to address this repaving issue in such a possibly destructive manner. Many residents have made this park their full or part-time home regardless of which area they reside in because of the camaraderie they experienced while visiting, even for a short time. That family spirit found here in TR is tangible and needs the same care and maintenance afforded any other asset.

TR Polices D3905 and D3910

D3905 SUB-LEASE OPTION: A lessee who will not be occupying their site for a specified period of time, (weeks, months and season), can sign Sub-leasing Authorization Form, authorizing the Office to sub-lease the site. This then must be executed and signed both by TR Management and the site sub-lessee.

D3910 EXERCISING THE SUB-LEASE PRIVILEGE:

- 1. If a lessee wants to sub-lease their site, he/she shall remove his/her RV from the site and sign a sub-lease agreement with TR Management.
- 2. Signing of the sub-leasing authorization constitutes a written contract between the lessee and Travelers Rest Resort, Inc. This contract is non-cancelable for the period designated and cannot be rescinded.
- 3. During the period of the sub-lease, the lessee forfeits and transfers all his/her privileges to the sub-lessee, without exception. (Note: The lessee is not allowed to sub-lease the use of the shed.) 4. All details of the sublease, including selection of sub-lessee and collection of sub-lease rent, will be handled by the Office. 5. As stated on Sub-leasing Authorization Form, the following applies: Sub-lease rental will be shared as follows: 65% to the site lessee and 35% to the Corporation.
- 6. All charges for electricity on sub-leased sites are the responsibility of the lessee.
- 7. Any RV placed on the sub-leased site must be removed at the end of the sub-lease. (Revised 03-24-15)



Reminder about watering restrictions

According to the Pasco County government website and the Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFMD), we've been in a drought and are currently under water shortage restrictions that are in effect through July 1, 2024. The SWFMD is ordering customers to strictly follow local irrigation and scheduling rules for your flowers, gardens and lawns, as well as vehicle washing and decorative fountains. The water schedules are organized by house numbers and for Travelers Rest the schedules are as follows:

Irrigation with potable, well or surface water is once per week. TR residents may water on Fridays before 8 a.m. and after 6 p.m. No irrigation between 8 a.m. and

Irrigation with reclaimed water is up to twice per week, though once a week is encouraged. Irrigation with reclaimed water is on Wednesdays and Sundays before 8 a.m. and after 6 p.m. No irrigation between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. Properties 2 acres or greater using reclaimed water may irrigate

from 12:01 a.m. to 10 a.m. or 4 p.m. to 11:59 p.m. on authorized

New plant material follows a different schedule allowing plants from day 1 to day 30 to be watered any day of the week.

Residential car washing including trailers and motorhomes shall be conducted only once per week. Per the irrigation schedule, that would be on Fridays before 8 a.m. and after 6 p.m.

Decorative fountains and features are not allowed unless they provide a necessary aeration and/or water quality benefit. Decorative fountains and features that use reclaimed water are allowed, however, a sign stating "using reclaimed water" must be posted next to the fountain or



crime now." This isn't a surprise. It's the wisdom of the world.

The apostle James says there is such a thing as false wisdom. It is characterized by "bitter envy and selfish ambition." James 3:16 says: "It is earthly, unspiritual and demonic. For where jealousy and selfish ambition are, there is confusion and every evil deed." This kind of false wisdom often results in conflicts, disputes and

James insists that we need divine wisdom instead of this devilish wisdom

In Psalm 111:10 we find these words, "The fear of Yahweh is the beginning of wisdom..." The wisdom that the Bible speaks about doesn't focus on how much we know, but on what sort of person we are. Biblical wisdom is never mere speculative thought. Wisdom in the biblical tradition is always the wisdom that is thoroughly practical. James would say that you cannot teach the truth unless you're committed to being that certain sort of person.

James says that true wisdom yields "the fruits of righteousness." In other words, James is arguing that you can talk all you weak when I got there. I don't fight witness to good works, you're not

too wise. James 3:13 says, "Who is wise and understanding among you? Let him show by his good conduct that his deeds are done in gentleness of wisdom.'

There's a big difference between smart and wise. The motto for our society could be stated this way: It is good to be clever. Our society values education, good grades and important degrees. But James would reply, "It is clever to be good." A wise person lives a life that is good. To use the language of James, the world may say, "It is good to be wise." But James says, "It is wise to be good." Jesus said we should be as wise as serpents and innocent as doves. But how do we get this kind of wisdom?

James explains how we can access the true source of wisdom. James 1:5, "If any of you lacks wisdom, let him ask of God, who gives to all liberally and without reproach; and it will be given to him." James says true wisdom comes "from above." This is true wisdom. It is characterized by purity, peacefulness, being reasonable, being merciful, producing good fruits, showing impartiality and no hypocrisy (3:17). It is the kind of wisdom that Jesus had.

The truly wise person is one who prays to be just like Jesus. I often say that we should pray that we will become less like us and more like Jesus. Jesus modeled for us the perfect kind of life, a life filled with the wisdom of good works and great faith.

Our template for godly wisdom is seen in James 4:7-8. "So, humble yourselves before God. Resist the devil and he will flee from you. Wash your hands you sinners and purify your hearts, for your loyalty is divided between God and the world."

You pour a second cup of coffee and as you pour you look out the window and see a person get out of a golf cart wearing a reflective vest moving toward your neighbor's door. You begin to wonder. Then you see another golf cart and then

Why are all these people here?

another. Within another minute or so there are about eight to ten golf carts, all with persons wearing reflective vests, getting out. One or two persons are going into the house, but the others are moving about the yard. Why are there so many people? My neighbor must be experiencing an emergency, but why so many First Responders?

TR First Responders have a Daytime Response Method and a Nighttime Response Method:

Daytime Response is between the hours of 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. During the day we, including First Responders, go about the business of taking care of their own lives running errands, going to doctor and dental appointments, getting groceries, etc. When the siren sounds, all available First Responders answer the call, thus you will probably see six to ten golf carts showing up at the scene of the emergency. It will then be determined how many responders are needed and the rest will be released from duty.

Nighttime Response between the hours of 9 p.m. to 8 a.m. is different. Teams of five to six persons are assigned to cover that timeframe.

Team Leader and Asst. Team Leader: enter the home and assess the natient.

Scribe: details the report and stands ready to assist the Team Leader as directed.

Gate Guy: goes to TR entrance to guide the ambulance and/or fire engine to the address.

This year there are five on-the-job trainees awaiting their bunker numbers and prepared to assist their fellow Responders.

When you ask "Why are all those people in my neighbor's yard?" It is about First Responders, who are all volunteers, answering the call for help.

Alert: Tuesday, Feb. 20, at 3 to 5 p.m., in Busch Hall, CPR and AED training will be provided by TR First Responders. Training is open to residents and guests.

Healthy Tips

Whole grains: here is the scoop!

Have you ever wondered why whole grains are better than refined grains? Or are you like me, a nutritional misfit? I have had the light-bulb go off in my head and realized that (a) I'm not getting any younger and (b) I need to eat better. Now I have to admit that Ken reads labels. He watches his fiber and likes only bread products and cereals made with whole grains so I decided I should check this out.

Grains, especially whole grains, are an essential part of a healthy diet. All types of grains are good sources of complex carbohydrates and some vitamins and minerals. Grains are also naturally low in fat. According to the Dietary Guidelines for Americans, the recommendation is that at least half of all the grains we eat are whole grains. Grains and whole grains come in many shapes and sizes and are the seeds of grasses cultivated for food.

What are the differences between whole grains, refined grains and enriched grains? Whole grains are unrefined grains that have not had their bran and germ removed by milling. Whole grains are better sources of fiber and other important nutrients such as selenium, potassium and magnesium. Whole grains are either single foods such as brown rice and popcorn, or are ingredients in products such as whole wheat in bread. Examples of whole grains include: barley, buckwheat, bulgur (cracked wheat), oatmeal, popcorn, wild rice, whole wheat bread, pasta or crackers.

Dr. Oi Sun, Assistant Professor of Nutrition at the Harvard School of Public Health, conducted an extensive study dating back to the mid 1980s that stated there was "clear evidence that the more whole grain intake, the lower the mortality rate." The study also stated that every one-ounce serving of whole grains reduced a person's overall risk of an early death by five percent. Imagine

Refined grains are milled, a process that strips out both the bran and many nutrients, including fiber. Refined grains include white flour, white rice and degermed cornflower. Many breads, cereals, crackers, desserts and pastries are made with refined grains.

Enriched grains means that some of the nutrients lost during processing are added back in. Most refined grains are enriched, and many enriched grains are fortified with some vitamins and minerals such as folic acid and iron. If all of the grains you eat are whole grains, you may need to take extra care to get sufficient folic acid, a B vitamin.

I guess I will now try to enjoy a breakfast that includes wholegrain cereals. I will have my noon sandwich with whole grain breads or rolls and replace white rice with brown rice to generally change my eating habits. Plus I will definitely check labels.

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Garden news

Lake Margaret Garden Club (LMGC) participated in the Activities Showcase on Wednesday, Jan. 10. The Club was happy to see so many people come by the table to chat and ask questions about the Garden. The Club gave away written material that was labeled with UF/IFAS which led to questions about what that is.

UF stands for University of Florida which is located in Gainesville. IFAS stands for Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences. UF/IFAS is an offcampus branch of the University and is part of a Federal Program providing the University with a Cooperative Extension Service.

The Extension Service performs many different services for Florida residents and businesses. It provides written material for LMGC to share with TR residents for home landscaping and planting. The Extension Service has experts available to answer questions about all aspects of home gardening. LMGC has a Florida Master Gardener who is a member, Phyllis Zitzer, who can also answer questions about what to plant.

Researching of UF/IFAS pointed to the Plant Hardiness Zones which gardeners use when deciding what to plant. The USDA has published a revised zone map as of November 2023, the first revision since 2012. Dade City and TR are in Zone 9b. This means that plant species are recommended that are hardy to withstand average annual low temperatures of 25 -30 degrees Fahrenheit.

Plants purchased from local nurseries should have a notice regarding which Plant Hardiness

Zone applies to each plant. Failing that, an employee should be able to find out into which zone the plants fit. Plant catalogues list the zone for each plant or seed they advertise.

UF/IFAS has two offices in Dade City. The Community Center address is 15029 14th Street. The phone number is 352-521-1254. The Cooperative Extension Service address is 36702 CR 52. The phone number is 352-518-0756. Both offices are open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The new Plant Hardiness Zone Map can be found at this website: planthardiness. ars.usda.gov

Mexican Eagle?

You might think this bird is a Spanish speaking cousin to the Bald Eagle. However it is not an eagle at all. The Crested Caracara is a large Falcon found throughout Mexico as well as Central and South America. At 26 inches tall it rivals the Eagle group in size and beauty. A 52-inch wingspan helps you to understand the comparison to an eagle. So what was he doing visiting Travelers Rest? Well who wouldn't want to visit our paradise? Some experts believe this is the first documented sighting in Pasco County since the late 1970s. Even though there are small populations in Central Florida, southern Texas and Arizona, this bird remains an uncommon


The beauty of the Caracara is displayed with a black to brown body and a crest of similar color on a flat head. White neck feathers and a featherless orange nasal area behind the beak complete the look of this spectacular Falcon. He looks so majestic then you discover that this bird can be found feeding on carrion. What? It is an opportunistic feeder and often hunts live game but spends most

of its time in the presence of Vultures cleaning up dead creatures. Highways and country roads are a common location to see these birds because of the presence of roadkill. The Crested Caracara does not have to battle for food, the Vultures yield ground when the Caracara makes its appearance.

Nesting and incubation duties fall on both adults. Pairs remain monogamous and defend their area of nesting with great passion. fend for themselves.



While numbers are improving

for this species in some areas, loss



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Nests are generally built in the tallest trees in an area surrounded by grasslands. Two or three brown speckled eggs will hatch in about 30 days. Both parents will carry food to the nest until the young fledge is 6 to 8 weeks. Fledglings will stay with parents for part of their first season as they learn to



We cannot express our gratitude adequately.






