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# If these walls could talk . . . Chapter 2

I have the distinction of being the largest building at TR and probably the first one built by the TR organization. Ground for my construction was broken on Dec. 8, 1972. Of course I was named after my father Jacob Busch.

Few people know that my current dimension of 80 x 150 feet was not the size originally planned. Actually I was only supposed to be 2/3 that size but it was quickly realized before construction began that the original proposal was way too small.

My original plans called for me to house restrooms, showers, laundromat, stage, a kitchen and have the capacity to seat 800 people.

I could probably write a whole book about all the activities I have witnessed over the past 52 years.

Every Sunday I am home to

the TR Church Service attended by hundreds of people. My grand piano is admired by every artist who has had the privilege of tickling its keys. With the theaterstyle organ on the opposite side of my stage they make an awesome pair. On Sunday evenings I host an Ice Cream Social and professionals who entertain our residents.

I have hosted Shareholders Meetings, Hobby and Art Shows, Talent Shows, Little Theatre, Health Fairs, Memorial Services, Friday Night Dances, New Year's Eve parties, Pancake Breakfasts, Spaghetti Suppers and card games to name just a few of the many events. I even held a wedding

But, just as times and uses change as the years pass, so I had to change.

I have had several different sound systems installed which necessitated a Sound Booth being built. This had to be expanded as my system grew and became modernized. Have you noticed my new LED lighting system for the stage? I now have the ability to produce lighting effects comparable to most commercial theaters. TV monitors now grace my walls. Pretty fancy eh!

My original kitchen has seen multiple upgrades causing its size to change considerably over the years. Why just this year my wall was pushed out to provide more

If you are new to the park you might not realize that I once housed a Country Store. That was discontinued some years ago and that space is now TR's Library.

A little-known fact about me is that my stage was enlarged many years ago. The original stage just came to where the curtain closes. The area in front of the curtain is my new section. Did you know that there are not supposed to be more than 55 persons on the stage at any one time? Just a couple of years ago my stage was dedicated to Doug Pedersen who was the MC for our Sunday Night Entertainment for many years.

Everyone has some secrets and so do I. Above the Choir Room, which is to the right of the stage, is a large storage area. This is where all the costumes from prior Little Theatre productions are stored. It is also the place where Gloria Polzin keeps her sewing

machine. Gloria is the seamstress who creates all the spectacular costumes for the theatre group and our Christmas pageants.

I have another room no one sees. It is above the Library. It is here that components of our new sound systems live.

A new cooling system has made visiting me much more comfortable in hot weather. I am proud to be Busch Hall and the center of so much activity. I think my father, Jacob Busch, would be proud of how I have been able to adapt over the years and still look pretty good. Speaking of looks, you should see me at Christmas when I really shine. Decorated trees, lights, sparkly decorations hanging from the ceiling, I really glow.

Can't help but wonder what the next 50 years will bring. Whatever it is, I am ready!


Fortunately Wolf Reimann has a drone and at Deborah May's request took photos of our system. These photos show the retention ponds discussed, as well as the physical structure of the plant.

Over the past 50 years that TR has been in existence, the park has invested approximately \$1.5 million in this facility.

The upgrades to the system, required by law, will probably total about \$600,000. As we were informed, instead of having to complete the project in one year, we have negotiated to complete within five years.

The first phase of the improvement will cost about \$150,000.

# Briefings from the Board

#### Pets

We are seeing a lot of new faces in the park so far this season. Each year several of our residents choose not to return for one reason or another. They either sell their unit on their lot or turn their lot in to be leased to someone else. I cannot emphasize to new stockholders the importance of reading our policies and procedures. You will find these posted on our website under Resident login. If you need help accessing this website, please contact the office.

Pets are always welcome except in RV South on lst, 2nd, 3rd and 4th Streets between 14th and 17th Avenues. (E2005) But we do only allow two pets per lot (two dogs, two cats, or one dog and one cat). (E2010)

The following canine (dog) breeds are prohibited on any site in RV South, the Cabanas, Golf View/Oak View and the Village. Pit Bulls/American Staffordshire Terriers, Rottweilers, Doberman Pinschers, Chow Chow, Wolf Hybrids, Akitas and Presa Canaios. Traveler's Rest reserves the right to refuse entry of any pet to the park, as well as the right to

require removal of any pet from the park. (E1011) When walking your dog, you are required to have it on a sturdy leash not to exceed 8 feet in length. Extend-a-lease (retractable leashes) are not permitted at Travelers Rest.

We are fortunate to have two public dog parks for our canine friends to run free in with shelters from the sun for their owners. One up by the Citrus Building and the other at the bottom of 10th and 14th Streets. Please observe the posted times at each park for small dogs and large dogs. The time is different at each park in order to facilitate all residents' schedules. All pets are required to always be under the control and visual observation of their owners. Allowing pets to run free will not

be tolerated. (E1025) These parks are run and maintained by the Pet Lover's Club. If you are interested in becoming a part of that group, watch for the posting of their meeting times on InTouch. They also help new pet owners who are in need of pet supplies and accept donations of gently used pet items such as beds, leashes, harnesses, clothes, etc. You will see them at the Flea Market in Busch Hall or at the Yard Sale in the park offering pet owners a chance to get items for a simple donation.

Travelers Rest anticipates having between 250 and 300 dogs in the park during this season. If you prefer to just walk your dog, please review the approved areas listed in Policy E2015 and the prohibited areas. The park does prohibit pets near Vanishing Lake because we do have at least one alligator and maybe more at any time. You may also see an alligator on the Golf Course, please be vigil when walking in those areas even if you don't have a pet.

All pets must be registered with the office regardless of how long you are here at Travelers Rest. The Travelers Rest Resort policies governing Pets can be found under E1000 to E2030 in our Policy

With the park running smoothly, Ray and I had to work at what to report. The hurricane debris is slowly disappearing, the park is filling up as people return and all is well, although a little chilly. One of the chores accomplished this summer was stripping, cleaning and waxing all the floors which gets Busch Hall and all the buildings ready for activities and entertainment. Ray said they always put eight coats of wax on the floors providing good protection for the whole season.

The new Dog Park roof is complete and will provide welcome shade when the hot Florida sun returns. The pool was cleaned and rebalanced, something they do twice a year. A cleaning agent is poured into the pool and left until the next day when the interior is

brushed clean. The hot tub is drained and cleaned three times a week then refilled using balanced water from the pool. Because of water temperature the hot tub uses extra chlorine to keep the water safe. The pool however is balanced with salt and has an automatic system to maintain the proper level. TR has four licensed crew members checking the pool two to three times a day. Should the water become unbalanced, they can manually provide the proper fix. Ray proudly assures us that Wes Frye, Scott Adamson, Tom Hall and Coty Adamson are properly licensed and always keep the TR pool safe and sparkling clean.

A resident, who lives on 10th Street, recently mentioned the troubling early morning truck noise and loud music from our neighbor Schwend, Inc. Ray said we maintain a good relationship with Schwend and he would alert them. During the summer when there are few people in that area the Schwend folks are perhaps less careful, but a friendly reminder about this seasonal concern will hopefully be helpful.

Trying to find other subjects we could talk about Ray and I thought next week park security might be interesting. What measures have been taken and what is planned for the future. Also if Ray ever gets any neat ideas for raising money for the golf course that may be a fun subject.

### FEMA to the rescue

Although hurricane Milton caused overall minimal damage to the buildings at TR, it did substantial damage to our trees and plantings. After the storm Maintenance and many, many volunteer residents worked diligently to clean up the mess the storm left behind. The result of these efforts produced a pile of debris 10 feet high along TR Boulevard roughly from the Office to the Duffer Deck. A similar pile existed along Johnston Road

While Maintenance and volunteer efforts gathered the debris the question arose as to how to dispose of this huge amount of material. Ray Hill and Deborah May contacted FEMA who agreed to remove the unsightly mess. The only catch was that they would not to commit to a date to get the work done.

Over the past week, FEMA contractors arrived to begin work that would take many days. The material along Johnston Road was the first to be removed. 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### To flush or not to flush...that is the question

During the last Forum residents were given an interesting presentation on the upgrades to the park's sewage treatment system. Several important facts came to light which we want to reinforce.





TR will own two new pumps which cost about \$10,000 each. As owners, we will be responsible for the maintenance of this equipment. Unfortunately there are several issues which may cause these pumps to fail at great expense to the park.

The most common cause of pump failure is people who flush "wipes." If you use these products you may or may not have noticed what is written on the packaging. Some say, in rather bold print, "Do not flush." Others advertise their product as flushable. Don't believe everything you read. No wipes should be flushed regardless of what the packaging says. My son is a civil engineer and he has some rather graphic photos of what flushing wipes will do to a system.

The second most common cause of pump failure is the use of kitchen disposals. Think about this. The disposal system will grind up most anything and flush it into the system. Are these materials biodegradable? Take chicken bones for example. While they may be ground into small pieces, those pieces will not biodegrade. Result, these non-biodegradable materials back up in the system. I have a septic system in my home in the north. I am extremely careful what goes down the drain. I do not even put grease down. Rather, I drain it off and put it in the garbage. At TR I had my disposal unit removed. If you have a disposal unit, please do not use it. Put the items in the garbage instead.

There was a commercial on TV recently for a brand of toilet. To illustrate the unit's flushing capabilities, a child was shown flushing the entire contents of the mother's purse. In yet another version of the ad an entire dozen golf balls were flushed! While the toilet may have remarkable flushing capabilities, no concern was given to the biodegradability of the items flushed! Our system is designed to biodegrade what is put into it.

It is hard to believe, but at one point in the past someone actually flushed a set of overalls. *mre*

### Why is hydroplaning so dangerous?

Everyone has at some time been told to slow down when driving on wet roads. But do you really understand why it is so important?

The friction between your tires and a dry road is what enables you to control the direction your car travels. However, when the roads are quite wet, that friction disappears.

When roads are really wet, it might surprise you to know that your tires do not actually touch the pavement below. When you drive at higher speeds, your tires tend to ride up atop a thin layer of water. This eliminates the crucial friction needed to control your car.

Newton's law of motion in part states: A body in motion remains in motion, in a straight line, unless an unbalanced force acts upon it. Translating this, your car will keep going in a straight line regardless of how you turn your steering wheel because it has lost the friction which kept it in contact with the road. The way to avoid this is to slow down. On a highway it is often beneficial to try to drive in the tracks of the vehicle in front of you.

### **Recent TR Blood Drive**

On Monday, Dec. 2 the first of two Blood Drives for the 2024-2025 season was held next to the TR Fire Station and ran from 8 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. The next Drive will be Monday, March 3.

The Drive went well, with one hitch; two busses were planned (three OneBlood staff per bus), but because of last minute staffing issues, it was changed to one Big Red Bus with five staff on board. A little "cramped," but still went well with very little wait time. A total of 27 TR residents boarded the bus, with 23 being able to donate. The TR Blood Drive was credited with 31 blood units given because 4 of the 23 chose to give "double reds" which are counted as giving 2 units. Each unit of blood has the potential to help up to 3 patients. Subsequently the 31 units can potentially help 93 patients. For the year 2024, (which includes the March 2024 Drive), TR residents gave 75 units of blood, giving the Gift of Life to potentially 225 patients. This, along with the several other giving/volunteering efforts outside our park, helps us make a positive impact in our surrounding community.

Although this was not a "record setting" achievement for a TR December Drive, it was considered both commendable and successful by OneBlood representatives for a one-day Drive.

### **Healthy Tips**

### Oh those achy feet - Part 3

The last two articles I wrote for this season addressed painful feet. The first one talked about Plantar Fasciitis followed by the second one about Heel Spurs.

There are other issues that can cause foot pain. Without getting too complicated, this week I would like to talk about Morton's Neuroma. A neuroma is a benign (non-cancerous) growth of nerve tissues that can develop anywhere in the body, but is most commonly found in the foot. A Morton's Neuroma is a thickening of the tissue that surrounds the nerve leading to the toes. This thickening can cause inflammation and is most commonly found between your third and fourth toes.

What causes a Morton's Neuroma? This painful condition can be triggered by wearing narrow, tight and/or high-heeled shoes. Additionally, activities that put excessive pressure on the ball of the foot such as running or other sporting activities can result in the growth of a Morton's Neuroma. Interestingly, my research also found that 40% of patients diagnosed with this also had a preexisting condition of rheumatoid arthritis.

The pain caused by this type of inflammation is sometimes described as sharp, burning or shooting pain in the ball of the foot or toes. Numbness and tingling in the space between the third and

fourth toes, toe-cramping and pain that worsens when wearing illfitting shoes or after long periods of excessive pressure on the balls of the feet have also been reported. The area between the third and fourth toes may also swell.

What can be done to relieve the pain of a Morton's Neuroma? First and foremost, see your healthcare provider or podiatrist. He/she will perform a physical exam and may recommend overthe-counter anti-inflammatory medications, corticosteroid injection in the affected area, changing footwear, icing the affected area, modifying a particular activity or possibly obtaining custom-made orthotics (shoe inserts). If these treatments are ineffective to relieve the pain caused by a Morton's Neuroma, an Ultrasound or MRI may be recommended. Surgical intervention may be the next step to relieve the pain. The latest and most advanced treatment for Morton's Neuroma is Nirvana Cryosurgery which is a non-invasive procedure that uses extreme cold to destroy the abnormal tissue.

As I have always suggested, listen to your body. If your feet hurt, please see your healthcare provider for treatment.







### Garden News

I am oddly obsessed with these plants. I do not know why they tickle my fancy, but they do, so I set out to learn more about them.

Just start with their name, BROMELIAD. Sound it out, "bro mee'lee add." Let that roll off your tongue. Feels good, right? For me, it is a fun word to say. Kind of like munchkin. Be grateful I am not asking you to roll its family name off your tongue - Bromeliaceae. Do not ask me to explain scientific

Speaking out their name may be tough, but growing them is easy and that is something I can dig. If you are a gardener from almost any other part of this hemisphere, you might catch my drift on considering these the hostas of the south. You pretty much cannot kill them and they grow wherever you stick one and, man oh man, can they multiply.

As they mature they have "pups" that sprout off the main plant. These pups can be yanked off, (or gently cut if that is your preferred gardening technique), and plopped into dirt and they will start growing - easy peasy. They thrive in humid conditions, mak-

They also come in a variety of styles and colors. Throughout the TR Garden you will see an assortment of types. Pictured are a few from the garden, but as always, I encourage you to come and see them in all their splendor. I have spotted green, green with red, brown, yellow, orange, as well as variegated (i.e., striped).

Regardless of color, bromeliads can also bloom. It surprised me the first time I saw a stalk growing out of a plant's "cup" (or "tank" depending on what resource you tap). Their blossoms vary in shape and size and are always a fascinating natural growth to see.

Now here is a fun fact. Spanish Moss is a bromeliad. You know, the gray stuff draped seductively amongst the big oaks and any other living or non-living object here in the south. It gives the bayou its

deceptively alluring appeal. This type of bromeliad is epiphytic, which is science for not requiring soil to live. They are not parasites, just nimble beings able to survive on the barest of microbes and only use their hosts for support.

The more "garden-variety" are terrestrial bromeliads. Per their adjective, they require soil nutrients to survive and flourish. Throughout the TR Garden there are several types of terrestrials. An example you may not expect is the pineapple. Now, you may ask, how can a fruit be a bromeliad? One word answer: nature. There are no pineapples in the TR Garden, but plenty of other bromeliad species for your viewing pleasure.



This beautiful bird is a resident of Central and South America but migrates to Florida and the southeastern U.S. to breed. The flight plan can reach up to 10,000 miles just to visit our great state. They are on the way now and will begin to arrive in a few weeks. They will stick with their young. You will see them soaring over open spaces that include tall pine trees that provide nesting sites as well as food sources. The Kite is no songbird that will visit your feeders, it is a migratory raptor. Lizards, snakes, large insects and even small mammals including bats are their preferred table fare.

Our golf course provides both tall pines and open spaces that creates the perfect environment for our visitors. They will build a nest a hundred feet up in these pines and lay two to four eggs that will require 28 days to incubate and another 36 to 42 days to fledge. The female incubates exclusively before both adults capture food for the nestlings. Like the adults, the young will develop into a 20 to 27 inch bird with a long-forked tail which is easily spotted. The wingspan can reach up to four and one half feet. This allows for, what seems like, a never-ending soaring pattern requiring little to no movement of their wings.

This black and white beauty is one of 50 birds targeted for

reintroduction into areas throughout the U.S. The Kites, at one time, were breeding in 21 states including all along the Mississippi River into Minnesota. This number has been devastated by loss of habitat and has dropped to just seven states with Florida having the only significant numbers. Measures are being taken to restore many areas in the hope of luring these creatures back to previous populations.

These birds were revered by Native Americans and symbolized freedom, transformation, balance, hope, perseverance, intelligence, beauty and unity. Those qualities are something we all should strive for and with effort on the part of everyone, we may be able to achieve just that. Let us all make an effort for positive change.

Lesson learned....never let your dog drive the golf cart.....at least not without you riding along to supervise.




## TR Foodies bring a new dining option to TR

course was planned for TR from the very beginning of the park. Before that happened though, golfers played area courses including the St. Leo Golf Course where the first tournament and golf banquet were held. By 1978 golfers developed a crude course with tin cans for cups and handkerchiefs tied to poles for flags on the greens.

By 1980, golfers requested permission from the Board to develop a nine-hole course with temporary greens. A professionally drawn layout for the course had previously been developed and was proposed as the plan with some minor alterations. Manager Paul Ruth had surveyed the wetlands where part of the golf course would eventually be built and calculated that it would need to be raised 4 feet above the existing level. He then calculated how much dirt would need to be removed to construct what is now Mirror Lake to provide the necessary fill dirt. The lake is 18 feet deep at the deepest end and the water level is three feet above the original level of the swamp. Amazingly, he received splendid cooperation during construction from the Florida Department of

Paul Ruth said that a golf Environmental Regulations. Today, the alteration of the wetlands to construct the course would simply not be possible.

Subsequently, many countless amounts of volunteer time and energy transformed the rudimentary course into the course that is played today. Various changes have been made in location and size of the greens and tees to improve play or make it more challenging. Fairways have been seeded with Bermuda Grass and the original greens were professionally replaced in 2006. Over the years teams of dedicated residents have joined with Golf Course Supervisor Ray Hill and staff to maintain the course and develop it as the beautiful "crown jewel" of the park.

Since the early 80s, the Board has delegated operational responsibility for the course to the TR Golf Association which coordinates golfing activity in the resort. Membership in the Golf Association numbers approximately 300 and volunteer help continues to be a vital part of course maintenance and development, enabling our golf fees to be among the greatest bargains to be found anywhere in the State of Florida.

- Setting out luminarias on Christmas Eve is a tradition at TR. We would appreciate all the help we can get.



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
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
