TR holds its first outdoor AGM

The 49th Annual General Stockholders Meeting was held in The Grove on Tuesday, March 9. Mother Nature cooperated by providing excellent weather for the event. The sun was shining, the temperature was perfect and the azaleas in bloom provided a beautiful backdrop for the event which was attended by hundreds of residents.

The meeting was opened with a moment of silence for all our residents who expired during the last year. This was followed by the flag salute led by Walt Gilson and an invocation by Pastor Shipe. Introductions were made of all those on the platform. These included all Board members, with the exception of Linda Gelinas who is in Canada, our attorney, CPA and Ray Hill.

Callie Zak announced that we had obtained a quorum making our voting legal and gave her President's remarks. She was pleased to note that as a result of the Board's decisions no one had died of COVID in the park. She mentioned the new Grove entertainment venue, the contribution of the Probes to Friday entertainment and the development of a new park website. Next year will mark the 50th anniversary of TR and a suitable commemoration is being planned.

Motions were made and approved to accept the Minutes and Treasurer's Report from the last meeting.

Jim Weigand spoke to the current financial status of the park. He noted that despite COVID the park remained in good financial shape and thanked the many residents who renewed their leases despite the fact that they would not be here this season. The Board was able to obtain a \$135,000 PPP loan for which we have met the criteria to have forgiven. Weigand discussed the change in the salary account necessitated by Florida's change in the minimum wage law.

announced that candidates had been obtained to fill three 3-year positions and two 2-year spots.

Sandy Nelson discussed voting procedures which were taking place in the Snack Shack Pavilion for those who had not previously submitted their ballots.

Zak, keeping to our By-laws, made three calls for nominations from the floor. None were made.

It was announced that John Green and Pam Wood had resigned from the Board during the year. The Board also accepted the resignations of Office Manager Donna Kerrick Hannah and Activity Coordinator Jeri Miller. Guy Weik was introduced as the new Activity Coordinator and Donna Sullivan as new Office Manager.

Callie Zak took the opportunity to recognize people she felt had provided outstanding service during the past season. Rosita Williams served as Corporate Secretary, Chair of the Nominating Committee and coordinated the food truck program. Jean Cobb served as Infection Control Officer and kept the Board apprised of CDC requirements, etc. Ray Hill was cited for managing the bestrun park. Finally, the Maintenance Staff was recognized for all they do year round, including their work during the heat of the summer.

There were no questions posed from those attending and the meeting was adjourned after just 45 minutes.

Travelers Rest is a great bargain

Board President Callie Zak recently conducted a survey to compare Travelers Rest with other nearby RV parks. She surveyed nine parks in Bowling Green, Brooksville (2), Bushnell (2), Dade City, Spring Hill, Webster and Wesley Chapel. You may find the results quite surprising.

The nine parks vary in annual rates from \$4,100 to \$9,600. One park does include electric usage in its fee. Compare this with the rates paid at TR. The lease fee for RV South is \$3,525 per year. The Cabana area is \$3,725 per year while park models are \$3,615. It may be surprising that The Village pays only \$2,828 annually. However, owners in The Village also pay real estate taxes which average about \$1,300 per year. So, their true annual cost is approximately \$4,128. You will note that the highest fee paid in our park is just a few dollars more than the lowest annual cost at nearby parks. This means that TR residents may be paying anywhere from about \$500 to \$5,500 dollars per year less than our neighbors.

Zak also compared the amenities provided by these parks. While most include wifi for email and Internet search only, one park charges \$6.95 per day for the service.

With regard to cable TV, three parks do not provide this, two levy a fee and in one park no dishes are permitted.

The following is a list of amenities and how many of the nine parks provide each:

Mail service - six Gated community - five Golf-one has a nine-hole course Pool - all Hot tub - five Sauna - one Tennis - three Pickleball - seven Club House - all Community activities - seven Community events - six Groundskeeper - one Cookout pavilion - four

Hiking trail - three Dog park - seven Activity center - six Fitness center - one Comfort station - six Laundry - all Bath house - six Paddle boats - one Shuffleboard - seven Fishing - four Library - two

When you juxtapose TR with all of these, although we are not a gated community, we have all the possible amenities with the exception of a sauna and paddle boats. Further, only a club house, pool and laundry are offered by all the parks.

As you can see, TR has both the amenities and low cost. Our sense of community and the many clubs and activities offered make TR a real bargain and a great place to call home.

of family entertainment. Enjoy!


Jan. 19 - GOTTA DANCE

The Servant's Plow

What if...?

Most people assume that Jesus died on "Good Friday" and arose from the dead on "Easter" Sunday morning. Since Jesus said He would rise on "the third day," some count part of Friday as one day, Saturday as the second day and part of Sunday as the third day. When we take a closer look at the Scriptures we find that Jesus spoke of the time between His burial and Resurrection as "three days and three nights." From Friday afternoon until Sunday morning is not three days and three nights! What then is the correct explanation?

In Genesis for example: "God divided the light from the darkness. God called the light Day and the darkness He called Night. So the evening (darkness) and the morning (light) were the first day... So the evening (now three periods of night) and the morning were the third day." (Gen. 1:4-13) Here is an example of the "third day" counted up and shown to include three days and three nights.

Bearing in mind that Jesus arose "the third day," notice that Sunday is not the third day after Friday: One day after Friday is Saturday, the second day after Friday is Sunday and the third day after Friday is Monday! Mark 8:31 says that Jesus would "be killed and after three days rise again." It seems evident then that there is something wrong with the widespread belief about Friday as the day of the crucifixion, or Sunday as the day of the Resurrection, or something is wrong with both!

At the time all of these events took place, from raising Lazarus from the dead to the Passover and on to the Resurrection, it was close to the Spring Equinox where day and night are of equal duration. Thus there were 12 hours in a day and Jesus said so in John 11:9-10. Three days and three nights would amount to 72 hours as the time interval between burial and Resurrection. However was this time exactly 72 hours? According to the Scriptures Jesus was in the tomb no less than 72 hours. He was in the tomb for "three days and three nights" and He arose "after three days" according to Matt. 12:40 and Mark 8:31. This has to be a full 72 hours.

On the other hand Jesus was in the tomb no longer than 72 hours. He said, "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up." (John 2:19) He spoke, of course, about His body. The time interval here expressed could not be anymore than 72 hours for if it was, Jesus would have arisen on the fourth day, not the third. There-

fore, since the Scripture indicates that Jesus was in the tomb no less than and no more than 72 hours, it is reasonable to conclude that He was in the tomb exactly 72 hours.

God is a God of exactness and His words are precise. Now since there was an exact time for Christ to be born, an exact time for His anointing, an exact time for His ministry to begin and an exact time for His death, it should not be regarded as inconsistent to believe that there was also an exact period that was to elapse between His burial and His Resurrection -72 hours exactly.

Bearing this in mind we can now understand what time of day the Resurrection took place. Since Jesus was in the tomb exactly 72 hours, we know that the Resurrection took place at the same time of day that He was buried, only three days later. Thus if He was buried at noon, could it be that His Resurrection took place at noon?

Scripture tell us that Jesus died about "the ninth hour." (Matt. 27:46-50; Mark 15:34-37; Luke 23:44-46) The Jews divided their daylight hour into four divisions. The Passover is very close to the Spring Equinox where daylight and darkness are each 12 hours, thus each division was of three hours and the "9th hour" was 3 p.m.

Following the Genesis account of Creation the Jews faithfully reckoned each new day to begin at sundown as noted in

Lev. 23:32. Jesus was crucified on "Preparation Day." There were two Preparation Days that week: The day before Passover and the second on the same day as Passover which was before the Festival of First Fruits. Both Passover and First Fruits were "high days" or Sabbaths. Measures were thus taken to ensure that the body of Jesus was removed from the cross before sundown, that is before the high day Sabbath, the Feast of First Fruits.

"Therefore because it was the Preparation Day and the bodies should not remain on the cross on the Sabbath (for that Sabbath was a high day), the Jews asked Pilate that their legs might be broken and that they might be taken away... But when they came to Jesus and saw that He was already dead (John 19:31-33)... He was taken down from the cross and buried in the tomb of Joseph of Arimathea for the tomb was nearby." (John 19:42)

"These things took place ...when evening had come because it was the Preparation Day, that is the day before the Sabbath." (Mark 15:42) The Greek word here translated "evening" is opsios, meaning "in the late afternoon." Therefore since the Resurrection of Jesus was to take place three days later, but at the same time of day as when He was buried, we know the time of day He arose. If He was buried in the late afternoon, then His Resurrection must have been in the late afternoon only three days later. We do know for certain that His Resurrection did not take place at sunrise because Jesus was not buried at sunrise. This is also evident from the fact that when the visitors came to the tomb as the next day was dawning, the tomb was already empty. (Mark 16:2) Nor did Jesus arise during the night for He was not buried during the night. He was in the tomb three days and three nights but He arose the third day, not at night.

Well, the different 2020-21 season of The TR Times is complete! Soon many will be headed back to their summer home. Of course, I always write about travel safety. and I will do that again. The difference this year is that we continue to stay, travel, or go to our summer home under the potential cloud of COVID-19. Some have gotten their vaccine, others have not; some states are lifting restrictions, others are not.



The SAFETY message is to 'Be Safety Conscious' when you move about - whether you are in a golf cart, on a bicycle, or in a car, in the park or on your way to your summer home. Don't let an accident sneak up on you!

As you travel on the highways, it is always a challenge to stay alert, deal with road congestion and construction and avoid other crazy drivers on the road. As you deal with other drivers who drive erratically, text, or are inattentive, it is a great idea to let your passenger answer your phone, handle text messages and do the navigation. Whether you are driving, with or without an RV, devote your full attention to the road. Also, be sure that you are alert and rested for every mile you drive. Stop every hour or so and walk around for a

few minutes - a little exercise keeps blood from pooling in your legs and improves mental acuity as well. Avoid heavy meals on the road that make you sleepy at the wheel, but don't skip meals which can lead to low blood sugar and potential trouble. If you find your attention wandering, you start yawning, or notice other signs that you need a break – take one! It is likely that a few minutes rest over the long haul of your trip will not be a problem. Finally, plan your travel days to allow for leisurely meals and restful overnight stops, and share driving with another driver if possible. Retirement is precious – don't risk your safety on the road.



The WELLNESS message is "Be Well - Stay Well." The mantra of 'wash your hands, don't touch your face' is still the best advice for preventing the spread of this

In addition, please be smart when you travel home. When you stop at a rest area, gas station, restaurant, campground, or motel, you may be exposed to the COVID-19 virus. We know folks, including you, can be COVID positive and contagious, feel fine, and not know they can spread the disease. Don't let your guard down. Wear your mask. Exercise "social distance" of 6' from others. Cleanse your hands after contacting surfaces or wear disposable gloves. In motels, wipe down doorknobs, TV controls, light switches, sink and tub hardware, and other frequently touched areas as soon as you check in. Take your own pillow and several pillowcases so you can change between stays. Leave your personal items in suitcases or plastic bags. Remove yourself from the presence of anyone who appears to be ill. If you are nervous about eating in a restaurant, eat on the patio, or order a meal to carry out and eat in your motel or camper. If you have to shop, do it very early or very late when customers are fewer. Finally, if you do become ill while you are traveling, seek emergency care if your fever, cough, or sore throat is accompanied by shortness of breath.







After the bus was sold due to liability and maintenance concerns, volunteer Tour Director Sharon Cook served as trip planner, banker and tour guide using commercial buses. Annual cruises, multi-day bus tours and day trips took TR residents as near as a luncheon cruise of Tampa Bay and as far away as Cuba.

Efforts to recover resident losses with the State of Florida Department of Agriculture were unsuccessful. And yet, many of us are still itching to travel with our TR friends.



Monkey squirrels?

Is there really an animal sometimes known as a monkey squirrel? Let me tell you about them.

Monkey squirrels are actually a type of fox squirrel that only live in Florida. There are two species - the main one is the Sherman's fox squirrel and the other one is the Big Cypress fox squirrel. At first glance these squirrels have an uncanny resemblance to monkeys. They are larger than other squirrels, have very long tails and their fur ranges from gray to red to black. But it's their face coloration -- mostly black with white around the nose -- that gave rise to their name. Take a closer look at them and you begin to realize they are not really monkeys.

Monkey squirrels are much more reclusive than the bold squirrels we usually see that visit our backyards in search for nuts and seeds. They prefer forests with an open understory where they can gather a multitude of nuts from

oaks, pines and hickory trees. They cleverly bury their "harvest" in numerous locations for future use. How do they find their supply later? Monkey squirrels have an uncanny sense of smell that guides them to their cache.

Birding Activity

A good birding season at TR

We have had several (uncommon to TR) "best birds" this winter season. Hopefully all birders have seen some of the good ones and maybe for the first time liters for them. It has been a great year to see the Painted Buntings which have been readily available, almost daily, at the "Peg's Post" viewing station by the Cabana end of the path through to 14th Street.

Peg's Post? It is a location on the emerging TR birding and nature trail that has been established over recent months by Tom Butler and the maintenance team. It has created a new feeding habitat for birds along with a place for walkers to rest and enjoy the view while birding. It will be developed further and one of the first feeder locations will be changed in order to meet the birds' requirement for foliage protection for them to escape potential predators. The feeders attract song and perching birds and we can already start to identify other promising areas like Norm's Nook by the Puppy Park and The Butler's Pantry which is located at the southern end of Vanishing Lake.

Birding in any area is always a changing scene and that certainly applies to us at TR over the winter months. Some birds wintering here in the hundreds, like the Palm Warbler, have already left us while the somewhat similar Pine Warbler is a year-round resident. The Robins are yet to arrive.

Some birds use TR as a rest stop and just pass through staying for only a few hours or, hopefully, a few days. Then again, some years birds that we have looked forward to seeing in the winter season haven't arrived at all. These include such wildfowl as Piedbilled Grebe, Black-bellied Whistling Duck, Hooded

Merganzer, Bufflehead and Wood Duck. A minimal number of ubiquitous Mallards have been spotted. Maybe we shouldn't be surprised as there are so many lakes and ponds to chose from all over Florida and it could be that we don't have enough of their dietary requirements at this time. Our Cranes, Herons, Egrets and Ibis have all been here as usual.

In the meantime we have had two "best-birds" in recent days. Both are raptors and are well worth looking out for. The first was a solo Swallow-tailed Kite, black and white and unmistakable as one of the most graceful and spectacular of all birds in flight. It is almost always seen swooping close to the treetops as it snatches insects and geckos in it's claws from the highest branches. It then eats them while still in flight. This species is normally seen regularly at TR, sometimes from mid-March onward as it returns to Florida after wintering in Central America. They breed in Florida, coastal Georgia and northern Gulf areas.

The second "best-bird" is an uncommon Short-tailed Hawk which has been seen twice recently

over the Puppy Park area. This bird lives year round in Mexico with a small population year round in southern Florida. From there some pairs move north into central Florida to breed. It is about the same size as the Red-shouldered Hawk which is the regular hawk at TR, but in flight it is obviously different. The Short-tailed Hawk soars frequently, is mostly white/ light color underneath, has black wingtips and a fan tail with one predominate bar. This bird is well worth getting on your life list.

The TR Jan. 1 to the end of March Bird List now has the impressive cumulative total since 2013 of 117 species. A copy of that list can be found on the Birding

Board in Busch Hall (which we hope will be available to view when restrictions are lifted soon). In the meantime, if you would like a copy by email let me know at normeden2@gmail.com.

Next season Iom Butler (lot 14-07) will take over the birding activities and there will be lots to see. Enjoy the year wherever you are and happy birding!



The Servant's Plow

A magnificent resource

Note: For several years Paul Freed, father of current TR resident John Freed, wrote a weekly column, Vistas, for *The TR Times*. The following article appeared on March 19, 2004.

Early on the morning of Sept. 13, 2001, three huge trailers moved out from the Caterpillar Factory in Aurora,Ill. The trailers carried a giant demolition machine and were headed for New York City to assist with rescue operations at the World Trade Center site. With flags waving and lights flashing the trailers made their way to I–80. The convoy passed over six different interstate highways and in 20 hours they were in New York City. All of this was possible because of our Interstate Highway System.

The first national road was cleared by soldiers under George Washington. It led from Baltimore to what is now Pittsburgh. As the population grew, old Indian trails, buffalo paths and river banks became passageways for horses and wagons.

One hundred years later, automobiles were found bouncing along the same routes. Exasperated one government official blurted: "What we need is some way to drive out of any county seat in the U. S. and drive to any other county seat and never crack a spring!" As if in answer, Pennsylvania built its Turnpike.

During WW II, which soon followed, virtually all transportation depended on the steel wheels of railroads. Coming to office, President Eisenhower determined that the nation's movements must never again be that restricted. In 1956 he introduced and Congress

passed the Interstate Highway Act.

In the next three decades moving 42 billion cubic yards of dirt and incorporating 1.5 million acres of land, engineers bulldozed, paved and opened a 46,677-mile network of safe, swift and scenic roads, up, down and across America. Curves kept cars safe on the road at 70 mph. Grades were limited to 6%. Medians 30 feet wide, cement barriers, landscaping which screened oncoming lights and breakaway signs were put in place to save lives. There are 104 tunnels and 54,663 bridges. One of them, our own Sunshine Skyway Bridge, is the longest cable-hung concrete bridge in the world.

In 1903, Nelson Jackson crossed the continent by car in 64 days. Today, on the Interstate, most drivers could make the trip in less than one-eighth the time.

On I-70 perhaps the most impressive section of the Interstate crosses Glenwood Canyon. Two thousand feet below the Colorado River rushes through a striking scene of jagged rocks and cliffs.

Engineers designed safety railings and created a double-deck highway, enabling motorists to see the

Soon many of us will be swinging onto this interstate highway system. In the pleasant knowledge that we go onto one of the greatest engineering feats of history, it is a joy to call to each other these happy, familiar words: "See ya' down the road!"


Note: When this column appeared in *The TR Times* on March 19, 2004, it was noted that this would be the last Vistas article as Paul Freed and his wife, Dorothy, would be leaving the *TR Times* after an association of nearly 19 years. This season it has been our pleasure to bring a selection of Paul Freed's columns to our readers. Interestingly, today, March 19, 2021 is exactly 17 years since this article was first printed.

On what day then was the Resurrection? Scripture tells us that when Mary Magdalene came to the tomb on the first day of the week, "it was yet dark and Jesus was not there." (John 20:1-2) The gospel writers tell of different visits made by the disciples to the tomb on that "first day of the week," that being Sunday morning. In every case they found the tomb empty. An angel said, "He is not here; for He has risen, as He said." (Matt. 28:6) Therefore since the Scriptures indicate that Jesus arose before sundown and since He was not in the tomb early Sunday morning, we may reasonably suspect the Resurrection took place late in the afternoon of the day before. According to this the Resurrection could have been late on Saturday afternoon.

The reader will immediately point out from Matt. 28:1-6, Mark 16:2-6; Luke 24:1-2 and John 20:1 that Christ arose on the first day of the week, very early in the morning. However careful reading shows that the tomb was simply found empty at this time. These verses do not teach that this was the time of the Resurrection. An objection might also be raised that Mark 16:9 teaches that the Resurrection was on Sunday morning.

KJV translates it, "Now when Jesus was risen early the first day of the week." Other translations like the NKJV say, "Now when He rose early on the first day of the week."

If we accept that Jesus had left the tomb before Sunday morning and had risen late on Saturday afternoon, we can now determine the day on which the crucifixion took place. Counting back three days and three nights, or 72 hours from late Saturday afternoon, brings us to Wednesday as the day of crucifixion. As we have seen, he died at 3 p.m. but then the body had to be taken down from the cross, transported to the tomb of Joseph, washed, wrapped and placed in the tomb before sundown. The preparation of the body had not been completed and the next day was Thursday, The Feast of First Fruits. This only left Friday to prepare the 100 lbs. of spices for burial. Saturday was another Sabbath, thus first light on Sunday morning was the first opportunity for Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of James to finish the work of anointing the body with the spices. (Mark 16:1, Luke 23:56-24:1, John 19:39-40)

A careful comparison of Mark 16:1 with Luke 23:56 provides us with further evidence that the First Fruits Sabbath was on Thursday. Mark states, "Now when the Sabbath was past, Mary Magdalene, Mary the other of James and Salome bought spices that they might come and anoint Him." (Mark 16:1) The KJV is the only version that the verb past tense, "had bought" i.e. purchased.

Mark, the Jew, states plainly that it was after the Sabbath that these women bought their spices. Here he refers to the First Fruits Sabbath on Thursday. On the other hand Luke, the gentile, states that they bought and prepared the spices before the Sabbath. "Then they returned and prepared spices and fragrant oils. And they rested on the Sabbath according to the commandment." (Luke 23:56) Luke refers here to the weekly Sabbath, on Saturday, so that the women had bought and prepared 100 lbs. of spices on the Friday. That was a lot of work and there was no time for them to anoint the body that same day; they had no choice but to wait until Sunday.




